

Criterion I : Curricular Aspects

Vasant Kanya Mahavidyalaya, a postgraduate institution has withstood the challenges of time to leave its imprint in the world of women's education only because of the fact that it draws sustenance from the vision of Dr. Annie Besant, Mahamana Madan Mohan Malviya, Dr. Rohit Mehta and others who worked to link up education with culture and balance freedom with responsibility. With a holistic end in mind, the college pursues the motto "education as service", so that the students become responsible citizens, able to serve the community. The academic, the co-curricular and the extra-curricular events brace the young girls up to face, understand and address the challenges of the society, which is changing fast.

A group of extremely efficient, committed and qualified teachers under the able administration of an open minded principal has successfully tried to achieve the goals for which the college has been established. With a resolve to start PG in other Departments, B.Com. B.F.A. and Dance Diploma courses in near future, the college at present is teaching 14 subjects relating to Arts and Social Sciences. The college aims at increasing both knowledge and skill of the students and encourage multi-disciplinary approach along with a thrust on community neighbourhood networking.

The proposal to introduce Choice Based Credit and Semester System (CBCSS) in the Under Graduate and Credit Semester System (CSS) in the Post Graduate programmes by the affiliating University will offer some extent of academic flexibility by selecting Complementary, Optional and Elective courses. The College now offers 14 UG programmes and 5 PG programmes in various disciplines. The teaching departments of the College offer 2 add-on programmes. To integrate the academic programmes and goal of the Institution, our College has taken several initiatives to supplement the curriculum. Regarding curriculum enrichment, the College is offering remedial coaching to slow learners. An efficient tutorial system is functioning in the College. The Institution is partially computerized in academic and administrative level. Free internet facility is available in computer lab. The College encourages the students to take part in extra-curricular activities such as NSS, Sports, Cultural Activities, and Debates etc. to inculcate social awareness among them. A well-structured feedback mechanism on curriculum is in operation in the College. Feedback forms are issued to outgoing students to assess their opinion in the matter of curriculum followed and other academic activities and if any lapses are noticed, corrective actions are taken immediately.

The focus is on skill development, career oriented programs, industry visit, industry - academia interaction. College has brought all these aspects under curriculum implementation and enrichment. Special attention is given to weak students especially belonging to SC/ST., OBC and minority groups.

Criterion – II - Teaching-Learning and Evaluation

The college admits students to its B.A. (Hons.) 3 years degree course and M.A. course through AIUET and AIPET organized by B.H.U. This calibrated system of examination admits meritorious students and after the admission to V.K.M. their knowledge and skill is assessed in the introductory classes. Sometimes remedial courses for educationally disadvantaged students are conducted under U.G.C. programmes. Informal tutorials, language courses and class-tests are also run by the teachers to help the students. The college follows Semester system of examination for B.A. (Hons.), and M.A course.

The college follows the academic calendar of B.H.U. It makes sustained efforts to inform students with the help of learner centered teaching methods. The college follows the U.G.C. norm of 239 teaching days and 284 working days.

Evaluation is a continuous process, which starts right from the beginning of the session and gets monitored until the commencement of the semester examination.

As mentioned above V.K.M. has a group of 46 qualified and competent faculties who have been appointed as per U.G.C. norms. As the pursuit of excellence happens to be a continuous process, workshops, seminars, lecture series, faculty development programmes are held successfully from time to time. These upgrade the information and efficiency of the teachers. The outcome of such positive endeavor reflects on the quality of their teaching and the final benefit goes to improve students.

The college is fortunate to have students from many states of India as admission is through All India Entrance Test conducted by BHU. The college follows the reservation policy of the Government of India in admission. SC/ST, OBC & PH are accordingly admitted in various UG/PG courses. The evaluation and examination process has undergone a major change with introduction of Semester system. The internal evaluation, showing of answer sheets, display of marks, etc. are hallmarks of this system which the college also follows. The college encourages staff development programmes to enrich the knowledge of the faculties.

Criterion – III Research Consultancy and Extension

V.K.M. is an institution where Research and Consultancy is an integral part of the system. At present five PG Departments offer Research. A number of our teachers have received Major/Minor Research Project Grant from U.G.C. and institutions like Sahitya Academy. 99% of our faculty hold PH.D Degree.

The college is successfully running 5 units of N.S.S. under the aegis of B.H.U., which involves the energy of approximately 250 students. There is Udaan, a budding Women Study Cell of the college, which trains the young girls to be aware of the social problems, gender issues and the ways to address them. The college is involved in extension activities too. It joins with different N.G.Os and semi-government organizations to this effect.

The college building, despite its limitations, is used to the optimum point to cater to the needs of students. The infrastructure is regularly and well maintained. Under special Building Grant, new rooms were added to the Block B.

Criterion V – Student Support & Progression

Scholarships are provided to students through College and Government mainly to financially weak students and students belonging to special categories (SC, ST, OBC and Minority). Medical facilities to students are available in the campus in the form of first-aid and a visiting lady doctor. Sports and Yoga are essential part of welfare activities aimed for students. A number of academic and co-curricular activities are organized for thr students under ‘Sarjana’. Students are provided career guidance & counselling through a specialized cell. College also has a Placement Cell, which has helped students find appropriate jobs for themselves.

Every year an average of 98% - 99% of students appear in the M.A and B.A. final Exams. The drop-out rate is very low and the reasons behind it are –

- 1- Marriage of girl students in mid-session
- 2- Medical reasons.

The college publishes an updated prospectus, which contains the information regarding course and subjects, examination/evaluation procedure, fee structure, refund policies, scholarships etc. There is one Student Advisory Committee in the College which relentlessly works for the welfare of the students.

There is an Alumnae Association also to co-ordinate past with present. The college boasts of its distinguished alumnae.

Criterion VI – Organization and Management

The college is run by Besant Education Fellowship (B.E.F., Adyar, Chennai), which forms College Management Committee. The Principal with the help of various takes important decisions. The college follows academic guidelines laid down by U.G.C. and B.H.U. The College Committee is formed to monitor internal quality checks, improvement and coordination.

The entire financial affair including fee structure and purchase of various items is regularly audited by local/private bodies/agencies.

The College follows the academic calendar prepared by B.H.U.

The grievance redressal cell functions satisfactorily addressing the various problems of the students and the staff members.

The college under the dynamic leadership of the Principal and valuable inputs from the Manager has gradually upgraded from UG to PG college and added career oriented programmes. IQAC is fully functional and is contributing to quality sustenance in all spheres of college activities. Participative Management is encouraged. There are various committees and cells to look after various activities of the College. Anti-Ragging Committee, Grievance Redressal Committee, Student Advisory Committee, Guidance & Counselling Cell, Placement Cell are some of the examples.

Criterion VII – Healthy Practices

The college basically functions with its resource of well-qualified staff, which works hard with the single aim to help the students realize their potential to the full.

On the one hand the staff keeps on upgrading itself with the help of Faculty Development Programmes, Seminars and Conferences, Workshops and on the other introduces and pursues various student-oriented activities. The programmes like N.S.S. sensitize the students towards the community and society, Udaan makes them aware of and competent to address gender issues, Sarjana nurtures the creativity of the students and instills in them a sense of ethical value.

The College tries to render personal care and attention to the students by interacting regularly with them. There is a continuous process to realize the high ideals of the aims and objectives of our college. The College strives to inculcate among students a balance between the sense of freedom and responsibility. They are also made aware to understand the need to interpret tradition in the context of modernity.

The College works towards the achievement of its motto of “*Education as service*”. with our limited means.

College has initiated number of innovations in the last few years:

1. Library Automation with LIBSYS software, Online access of INFLIBNET through NLIST, Bar Coding, Photostat facilities for students.
2. Infrastructure development through the Grants received from UGC under the implementation of OBC reservation policy.
3. Better Internet connectivity by making office, staff room, library computer Lab wi-fi enabled.

Summary

1.1 Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 State the vision, mission and objectives of the institution, and describe how these are communicated to the students, teachers, staff and other stakeholders.

The VISION of the College

The life and work of Dr. Annie Besant, the great nationalist leader, a pioneer in the field of women's education and the first President of Theosophical Society (Indian Section) inspired Dr. Rohit Mehta, a renowned thinker and a frontline theosophist, to found Vasant Kanya Mahavidyalaya. The basis of the goals and objectives of the institution is embedded in the following statement of Dr. Rohit Mehta:

"Our endeavor in V.K.M. is:

- 1) to link up education with Culture and Tradition with Modernity.*
- 2) to maintain higher academic standards.*
- 3) to enable the girls to imbibe the finest cultural traditions of the land.*
- 4) to synthesize full freedom with total sense of responsibility."*

"Education as Service" is the driving force behind the institution.

The MISSION of the College

Vasant Kanya Mahavidyalaya (NAAC 2007 Level B++) derives its name from Dr. Annie Besant who loved India as her mother land. She was a patriot in her own right, a Theosophist, an educationist and a relentless worker for the cause of women. The significance of this great name has acted as a decisive factor in ascertaining the identity of the college right from its inception in 1954. Engaged with the ideal of "Education as Service" and dissemination of Besant spirit, this institution coheres tradition with modernity and imparts an education enriched with academic and extra-curricular programmes to inculcate in the students individuality, discipline and respect for values.

Our mission is:

- To equip and empower students with relevant knowledge, competence, value and creativity to face global challenges.*
- To provide quality education to women.*
- To strive continuously to fructify the physical, intellectual, moral, spiritual and aesthetic capacities of women.*
- To achieve innovations in teaching-learning, research and extension activities.*
- To promote participation of all the stake holders in the development of the college.*
- To facilitate optimum use of human and natural resources for sustainable development.*
- To pursue student-centric learning for self-development and skill development among students.*
- To promote and practice inclusive growth.*
- To create awareness on human rights, value system, culture, heritage, scientific temper and environment.*

The College communicates the aims and mission of the College to students, teachers and staff through its Prospectus and by organizing a number of programmes throughout the year. Annie Besant Spirit Progression Committee is dedicated to make the students, teachers and staff well acquainted with the lofty ideals of Dr. Annie Besant. The College organizes various co-curricular and extra-curricular activities besides academic programmes, which promote scientific temper and a value system among students, teachers and staff. Other Stake holders like Alumni and Parents are made aware of the aim and goal of the College through College website, Prospectus, College Magazine "Vasantshree" and various programmes organized from time to time.

1.1.2 How does the college develop and deploy action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum? Give details of the process and substantiate through specific example(s).

The college is affiliated to Banaras Hindu University, therefore follows the curriculum developed by the University Board of study. Our faculty members actively participate in discussions regarding changes/modifications in the curriculum.

For the effective implementation of the curriculum, following steps are taken:

- In the beginning of the session the Principal organises a meeting with the Head of Departments to discuss various strategies for effective implementation of the curriculum.
- Teachers are motivated to use innovative methods of teaching such as interactive lectures, group discussions, presentations, organising workshops, etc.
- The staff members of various departments conduct their internal meetings and develop plans for the coming academic year.
- The library regularly procures new books according to the requirement of the syllabus.
- The curriculum is further supported by educational tours/industry visits and other implicative methods developed by the faculty members of the college.

1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and/or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

- The curriculum prepared by Banaras Hindu University (BHU) to which the college is affiliated is well translated to students after serious preparation and analytical thinking.
- The teachers are regularly in touch with their respective departments/faculties regarding the successful implementation of the curriculum. They are quite considerate in updating and enhancing knowledge of our teachers and students through guest lectures for the newly introduced topics.
- The faculty members of our college regularly attend the meetings, workshops, orientation, refresher programmes organized by BHU to keep their knowledge and teaching aptitude updated.

- The college also provides modern academic tools, i.e. object cameras, laptops, LED projectors etc. to the faculty as per their requirement along with guest lectures, workshops and academic tours.
- PhD scholars use the University laboratory and library.

1.1.4 Specify the initiatives taken up or contribution made by the institution for effective curriculum delivery and transaction on the curriculum provided by the affiliating University or other statutory agency.

The curriculum is designed and revised by BHU and the college follows the syllabus and evaluates process as initiated by the University. But for the effective curriculum delivery the college gives weightage to academic improvement and overall development of students through various forums of college.

1. The college relies upon the globally trusted and followed teaching strategy, the chalk and talk method.
2. Faculty members of the college also use modern technological resources such as LED Projectors, object camera, interactive board etc to make their class room lectures more effective.
3. The college has fully automated library with latest books, CDs, access to N-List through INFLIBNET, relevant magazines and newspapers for the faculty members and the students.
4. For better understanding of the syllabus the college organises special lectures, educational tours, to industries/exhibitions/places of historical importance.
5. Furthermore, for effective curriculum delivery, our faculty members take personal initiatives to interact and resolve subject-related problems of slow-learners.

1.1.5 How does the institution network and interact with beneficiaries such as industry, research bodies and the university in effective operationalisation of the curriculum?

For effective operationalisation of the curriculum, the college administration interacts with industries and workshops.

Industry - The College has set up Guidance & Counselling and Placement Cells, which maintain professional relations with the representatives from industries.

The students of various departments (Home Science, Psychology, and Economics) of the college are taken for industrial visits from time to time to keep them in touch with the latest developments in the market. Students of Home Science department go for internship in prestigious industries of Varanasi and other cities.

Research Bodies - To keep the research temper alive in the campus, various eminent scholars are invited to the college to motivate the faculty members to take up research projects from UGC and other funding bodies. Our college committee and IQAC also actively take up the task of encouraging and planning newer projects through faculty members.

Faculty members on their own also keep interacting with various research bodies and participate in various research projects which in turn helps them in effective operationalisation of the curriculum. Some of our teachers (Psychology department) have successfully completed international projects as well.

University - Faculties of the college keep in touch with the University and get latest information regarding their own subjects. It helps them to keep abreast with the latest trend in their field of study. Faculty members, personally as well as at the college level, subscribe to the journals and magazines of national and international repute.

Further, Professors and eminent scholars from Universities are also invited to the college for interactive talks with the faculty members.

1.1.6 What are the contributions of the institution and/or its staff members to the development of the curriculum by the University?

Teachers of concerned departments participate in the deliberations of various boards of study in accordance with the laid down provisions of the University ordinance and regulations. Normally such meetings are held once a year depending upon the requirement of the subjects of discipline concerned.

Yes, the institution has developed two diploma/certificate add-on courses in "Spoken English" and "Fashion Designing". The process involved is as follows:

1. The College prepares the Curriculum and Ordinance for these courses.
2. Then, this is discussed with the Head and other senior faculty members of the concerned department of the University.
3. The Curriculum and Ordinance is discussed in the Board of Studies meeting convened by the Head of the concerned department. This is passed with any changes/ modifications as the Board seems fit.
4. This is then passed in the Faculty meeting.
5. Finally, it is passed by the Academic Council (AC) of BHU.

1.1.8 How does the institution analyze/ensure that the stated objectives of curriculum are achieved in the course of implementation?

The institution has formed communication channels among all the stakeholders to ensure that objectives of the curriculum are achieved in the course of implementation. Once the academic session is in full swing and all the laid action plans are followed, the college at various points takes stock of the effectiveness of these action plans. Also, the college ensures that during the course of implementation, the stated objectives of the curriculum are achieved. To do this, various tests are conducted to monitor the outcomes of the syllabus. Systematic documentation is maintained to review the outcomes

of the curriculum. If at any step, the college realizes that the laid objectives are not being achieved, it plans for a remedial action and strategies are devised to cover up the gaps.

2. **Fashion Designing** -Introduced in 2013-14 and run by the department of Home Science, the course is designed as per BHU guidelines and financed by UGC/

1.2.4 Does the institution offer self-financed programmes? If 'Yes' list them and indicate how they differ from other programmes, with reference to admission, curriculum, fee structure, teacher qualification, salary etc.

The college runs two certificate courses under self-financing scheme:

- 1. Spoken English**
- 2. Fashion Designing**

- **Admission** -During orientation programmes, admitted students are apprised of the programmes, and written notices are also displayed regarding course content and fee structure. Interested students fill the forms which are analysed by the concerned department that are running the courses. List of admitted students is displayed on notice boards with last date of fee-submission. If required, students are given extra time for fees submission or fee is divided in two instalments.
- **Curriculum** - The curriculum is designed by the Department running the course and is duly approved by the Board of Study of the affiliating University, i.e. BHU. Use of LCD Projectors, DVDs, computers, audio

equipments and other necessary equipments is made for the effective implementation of the courses.

- The teachers of concerned Departments (English and Home Science) and guest faculty take classes of these self-financing courses and they are given honorarium as per UGC Guidelines.

1.2.5 Does the college provide additional skill- oriented programmes, relevant to regional and global employment markets? If 'yes' provide details of such programme and the beneficiaries.

The college offers two self-financing courses in *Spoken English* and *Fashion Designing* which develop skills in students that are needed to match the requirements of global employment markets. (*for details please refer to 1.2.4 and 1.4.3*)

The college conducts additional skill oriented programmes that are relevant to regional and global employment markets and also help students excel in their core courses. Departments of Home Science, Psychology, Music (Vocal & Instrumental), English, Sociology, AIHC & Arch., Philosophy, and Sanskrit have organized workshops for the skill enhancement of students.

Department of Home Science organized an annual exhibition of the products made by the students.

- An exhibition *Tana-Bana* was organised by the Department of Home Science on 11.04.2015 & 13.04.2015. It was inaugurated by Shri V.K. Shukla, Director, Khadi Gramodyoga Ayoga, Divisional Office, Varanasi. Students of Home Science – B.A. Hons, M.A. and Fashion Designing (Certificate Course) participated in the exhibition. Cushions, Bags, Tapestry made through the technique of tana-bana (weaving) and designs of modern weaving were the chief attractions. In order to keep alive and promote folk art, designer clothes and household items of Madhubani, Gond, Mandna and Chittar Art were displayed. Jewellery made of paper, clay, fabric as well as fancy jewellery with folk designs were prepared. Items having folk embroidery and craft such as Khatwa, Tikli, Applique, Patwa, Bandhani and Batik work were also prepared. About 200 students participated in the exhibition.
- *Hunar* is organised by the Department of Home Science, with the objective “*Earn while you Learn*”. Under this annual programme, skilled students i.e. students of Home Science impart training to the unskilled students who pay a fixed fee. The programme is organised to increase the enterprising skills of the students. Workshops and training programmes on Bandhani, Printing, Sewing, Hair Style, Saree Draping, Makeup, Flower-making, Mehandi, Salad Carving, M-Seal products, Glass painting, Free-hand painting, Gift-packing and Embroidery are organised under the programme.



Every year the college organizes a number of workshops and training programmes for skill enhancement of the students relevant to regional and global employment markets.

- A workshop on '**Flower Arrangement**' was organized on 12.04.2016. Speaker was Ms.Manisha (Faculty, Gyanpur P.G. College). The workshop was organised for students of B.A. II & IV Semester. 3 students of M.A. II Semester participated in a **4 week Internship** programme organised by **She Boutique**, from 01.06.2016 to 28.06.2016. The students acquired skill in '**Pattern-making and Sketching of Designer Garments**'.

- 12 students of M.A. II Semester participated in an *Internship programme* organised by *Umrai Fashion*, Varanasi from June 2 to July 1, 2015, on designing of home furnishing.
- 5 students of M.A. II Semester participated in a *4-week Internship* programme from 01.06.2016-28.06.2016 on '*Grading, Pattern-making, Commercial Patterns*' organised by the Institute of Professional Studies, University of Allahabad.
- A workshop on '*Repairing a Sitar*' was held on 30.03.2016. Speaker: Shri Radheyshyam Sharma. Students and faculty members of Vocal and Instrumental Music participated in the workshop.
- A ten day workshop on '*Chandogaan*' was held from 01.03.2016 to 10.03.2016. 10 students of B.A participated in the workshop.
- A workshop on "How to Repair a Tabla" was held on 18.09.2014. Speakers were Imran Ali and Kamran Ali. Students and faculty members of Vocal and Instrumental Music participated in the workshop.

Besides this, college forums like NSS, Sarjana, Spandan, Udaan, Guidance & counselling cell, are some of the other channels that provide students with opportunities to develop their organizational, communication and other aesthetic skills.

1.2.6 Does the University provide for the flexibility of combining the conventional face-to-face and Distance Mode of Education for students to choose the courses/combination of their choice? If 'Yes' how does the institution take advantage of such provision for the benefit of students?

The affiliating University does not allow the flexibility of combining conventional face-to-face and distance mode of education.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1 Describe the efforts made by the institution to supplement the University's Curriculum to ensure that the academic programmes and Institution's goals and objectives are integrated?

The institution, being an affiliated college, does not have the freedom of formulating its own curriculum. However, the courses run at UG and PG levels have their relevance to the institution's goals and objectives.

The college academic calendar is prepared every session with the active involvement of the heads of various departments and the college committee under the guidance of the Principal.

To integrate the academic programmes and institution's goals, our college has taken the following initiatives to supplement the University's curriculum:

- Guest Lectures, Seminars, Workshops, Training Programmes and Industrial Visits are conducted to achieve awareness of the current industrial demands. The college offers various opportunities to the students such as projects/dissertations, presentations, assignments, group discussions, seminars, written/oral tests, quiz etc.

- The College lays impetus on Spoken English and computer literacy to inculcate good communicative and presentation skills among the students.
- Educational tours are organized to develop interpersonal relationships and to create awareness about the cultural heritage of our country.
- NSS is an additional facility which inculcates social responsibilities, team work and community orientation amongst the students. Various academic and cultural competitions are conducted for creative and all-round development of the students.
- Two certificate courses are offered to the students as add-on programmes to supplement the curriculum provided by the University so as to ensure more employability to the students.
- Red Ribbon Club, functioning in the College since 2013, takes up community services like blood donation.
- Competition committee conducts debates on various contemporary issues and also prepares and sends students to competitions organized by other local institutions.

1.3.2 What are the efforts made by the institution to modify, enrich and organize the curriculum to explicitly reflect the experiences of the students and cater to needs of the dynamic employment market?

The institution can only enrich and organize the curriculum by supplementing it with extra courses (discussed in point 1.3.1) so that the students are benefited in the best possible manner. The institution has taken measures to cater to the global market needs based on the true assessment of strengths and services offered in the campus. To develop the required skills, brainstorming sessions are held for the faculty to design the tools in the areas of Spoken English, use of computers and providing in-depth knowledge in the respective subjects. Under the guidance of various committees, special training and tailor made orientations are conducted to enable the students to achieve the global standards.

The institution is mostly computerized at the administration and academic levels. Computer lab is well equipped with latest computers. Internet facility is made available at the library. Computers, LED Projectors, interactive boards, object cameras are used for effective communication and teaching. This enables all graduates to be familiar with computer fundamentals which enhances employability.

1.3.3 Enumerate the efforts made by the institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc., into the curriculum?

The University constantly upgrades its curriculum to integrate the cross cutting issues such as gender inequality, climate change, environmental education, human rights, ICT etc. The College, at its own level makes arrangements for external seminars and conferences wherein experts from the above mentioned fields are invited to share and deliver their experiences and knowledge. Following are the efforts made by the College in this direction:

- The Women's Studies Forum of the College *Udaan* organizes invited talks on women related issues such as early marriage, physical and psychological harassment, gender inequality in home and workplace etc.

Udaan aims to analyse and bring to light the various levels of female psyche or consciousness.

- The college regularly organizes National seminars on women empowerment, Human rights of Women, Environment, and Higher Education etc.
- A number of our faculty members regularly deliver lectures, present papers, publish research papers on the relevance of environmental education, human rights etc. *Gender Sensitization* and *Environmental Education* are an integral part of both UG and PG syllabi of BHU.

The College offers various value-added courses/enrichment programmes for the holistic development of students as mentioned below:

- Annie Besant Spirit Progression Committee organizes a number of programmes throughout the year to inculcate moral and ethical values among students. The tools adopted by the committee for the progression of Annie Besant Spirit are :
 - **Lectures:** Various eminent scholars are invited to deliver lectures on the immortal philosophy of Dr. Annie Besant.
 - **Tours:** The students are taken to various places inhabited by Dr. Besant during her life in the Indian Section Headquarters of the Theosophical Society (Parent Body), Varanasi.

- **Publications:** In order to propagate the ideas of Dr. Annie Besant and Mahamana Madan Mohan Malviya, the college published *Yug Chetna* in 2010.

- The Placement Cell of the college organizes various training programmes for the students to increase their chances of employability.
- The college offers Career Counselling for the students which provides better opportunities for employment. Various departments of the college regularly organize student seminars/ talks and train the participants in presentation skills.
- The college offers certificate and diploma courses in Spoken English and Fashion Designing. These programmes ensure better career options to students.
- Students are also allotted different responsibilities in organizing various events and activities such as cultural programmes, competitions, seminars, workshops etc. In this way they improve their team building and organizational skills.
- The NSS units visit surrounding areas and villages to spread awareness on various social, moral and ethical issues.
- Students are encouraged to participate in intercollegiate programmes organized by other colleges which provide them with an opportunity to interact with fellow students and assimilate new knowledge. *(for details please refer to Annexure 4-student oriented activities)*

1.3.5 Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum?

The college informally interacts with various stakeholders such as students, alumni, employers, parents, faculty members, university departments etc from time to time on various points like infrastructure, support facilities, academic improvements etc. The students express their opinion on curriculum through feedback mechanism. Oral responses are also considered. The Feedback Committee and IQAC analyze the feedback and take remedial measures. The feedback with regard to the curriculum is communicated to the University during interface meetings of the faculty at the time of restructuring the curriculum.

1.3.6 How does the institution monitor and evaluate the quality of its enrichment programmes?

The college has a very clear and transparent way to monitor and evaluate the quality of various enrichment programmes initiated by it.

The IQAC monitors and evaluates the efficiency and success of these enrichment programmes. It suggests suitable changes in the enrichment programmes to meet the desired objectives. The college makes sure that the programmes offered in the curriculum include contribution to national development, fostering global competencies among students, inculcating a value system among students, promoting the use of technology and quest for excellence.

The college uses education as the tool for empowering its young women students and through the implementation of the curriculum it has adopted, it seeks to promote the all-round development of the students enrolled in the various academic programmes.

1.4 Feedback System

1.4.1 What are the contributions of the institution in the design and development of curriculum prepared by the University?

The University designs and develops the curriculum of all the programmes. The college strictly follows the curriculum, designed and developed by the affiliating university. However, senior faculty members of the college are invited by the concerned department of the university to attend meetings held for revision of syllabus and their suggestions are incorporated after deliberations. The college faculty contributes in the modification and revision of the curriculum. The faculty members attend workshops and seminars whenever there is revision of curriculum.

1.4.2 Is there a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on Curriculum? If “yes”, how is it communicated to the University and made use internally for curriculum enrichment and introducing changes/new programmes?

The college encourages various stakeholders such as students, alumni, faculty to give their feedback and communicates it to the concerned departments of the university through suitable channels. The feedback in the form of interactions, discussions and suggestions is analysed by co-ordinators of various committees. The college collects all feedbacks and communication in the form of questionnaires from the students which are then analyzed and inferences are drawn from them. The feedbacks are discussed in the staff meetings.

1.4.3 How many new programmes/courses were introduced by the institution during the last four years? What was the rationale for introducing new courses/programmes? (Any other relevant information regarding curricular aspects which the college would like to include.)

The college runs two Certificate Courses and one Diploma Course. The courses were introduced as a part of UGC's Career Oriented Scheme as add-on courses along with the conventional UG/PG course.

Certificate course in spoken English was introduced in 2009-10. Certificate course in Fashion Designing was introduced in 2013-14.

The objective of the scheme is to introduce career and market-oriented, skill enhancing add-on courses that have scope for job, self-employment and empowerment of the students. At the end of three years, the students are equipped with a certificate/diploma/Advanced Diploma in an add-on orientation course along with a conventional degree in Arts/ Social Science.

Certificate and Diploma Courses in Spoken English - The Rationale

In this age of globalisation, the world is heading towards a universal citizenship. English language provides a common platform for communication to its universal citizens. As an Indian student is very much part of the global village, hence in order to communicate with his fellow citizens, English is his necessary requirement. However, India itself is a multilingual nation and spoken English serves as a major tool of connectivity among the fellow Indians, connecting South India to North India or East India to West India.

Since 2009, the college is running successfully a Certificate and Diploma course in Spoken English, recommended by UGC and approved by BHU.

The objective of the course:-

1. To increase the students' practical knowledge and hereby, confidence, when communicating in actual situation.
2. To improve the students' understanding and ability to use aspects of pronunciation correctly.
3. To enable the students' to review some of the typical idiomatic language found in everyday speech and improve their understanding of it.
4. To develop the students' understanding of stressed and unstressed elements of pronunciation.
5. To provide the students with practice in recognizing a range of functional language that can be used for different purposes in formal speaking situations.
6. To enable the students to develop a range of vocabulary and improve grammar and pronunciation.

Certificate Course in Fashion Designing- The Rationale

One year Certificate course in Fashion Designing, approved by UGC, has been running in the College since September 2013. As Varanasi is the Centre of Weaving and Textile Designing, the course provides immense opportunities to students. The course enhances the natural creative skills of the students. The Fashion Designing course offers opportunity to become a fashion designer, fashion coordinator, fashion script writer etc. During the course they learn technical aspects like elements of design, pattern making & ornamentation.

The main objective of the course is to develop technical and professional competence and skill among students. Expertise in a concerned skill provides opportunities to students in industry and self-employment sector. Demand and scope for such professionally trained graduates is visible in the applied field of approved designing industries.

The syllabus was made as per UGC Guidelines. The course frame is of 20 credits. Each credit has 15 hours of workload out of which 8 credits are assigned to field work / practical.

CRITERION II: TEACHING – LEARNING AND EVALUATION

2.1 Student Enrolment and Profile

2.1.1 How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

The college follows the admission process as formulated by BHU through a centralized UG & PG Entrance Test (UET & PET). Research Entrance Test (RET) is also conducted by BHU, the affiliating University to enrol research scholars.

2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission(Ex.(i) merit (ii) common admission test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (iii) combination of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test and interview (iv) any other) to various programmes of the Institution.

All India Entrance Test – UET / PET & CRET is conducted by the University for admission to various UG, PG & Ph.D. courses respectively. NET, RET – Research Entrance Test is also conducted by BHU, the affiliating University, to enrol research scholars.

2.1.3 Give the minimum and maximum percentage of marks for admission at entry level for each of the programmes offered by the college and provide a comparison with other colleges of the affiliating university within the city/district.

The college follows the criteria as per the norms of the Government of India. The following percentage of marks are essential at the level of qualifying examination i.e. 12th standard and graduation for admission to UG & PG courses respectively:

All the four affiliated colleges of BHU follow the above- mentioned guidelines.

2.1.4 Is there a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and student profiles annually? If ‘yes’, what is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

The admission process is totally directed and managed by the affiliating University – BHU.

The college strictly adheres to the Government of India norms in this regard for students belonging to SC/ST, OBC and differently-abled categories. The students are given fee relaxation, age relaxation and minimum marks relaxation at the entry level.

The students of economically weaker sections and minority communities are helped in availing financial assistance/scholarships provided by the State Government / Central Government.

VKM is a women's college, as such only female students are admitted at UG and PG levels.

Admissions are made through AIUET and AIPET conducted by BHU. All applications for requisite entrance tests are received online by BHU. Admission is a centralized process.

The total number of seats for UG (Social Sciences & Arts) is 495 and for PG it is 161. Almost 100 % of the seats are filled every year through a centralized admission process.

VKM is a very popular choice among students and the general trend is that students opt for admission to VKM at the very beginning of the admission process.

2.2. Catering the Student Diversity

2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

The college adheres to the Government's policy of horizontal reservation for the differently-abled. They are provided:

1. 5% relaxation in the marks of qualifying examination for entry into UG & PG courses.
2. Age relaxation of 5 years at the entry level.
3. 10% reservation in the college hostel.
4. Specially designed washrooms and ramps for the differently-abled are part of the future plans of the college.

2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

An orientation programme for all new students is held every year to make them aware of the academic, co-curricular activities and curriculum and facilities available in the college.

In keeping with the nature of the discipline, the students' knowledge and skills are further assessed through specially designed group discussion sessions, classroom interactive sessions, assignments as considered relevant by subject experts.

2.2.3 What are the strategies adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students (Bridge/Remedial/Add-on/ Enrichment Courses, etc.) to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice?

Remedial courses have been organized for SC/ST students in English, Psychology, History, AIHC & Arch. and Economics in terms of the broad parameters as reflected in UGC guidelines.

The college also runs two add-on courses i.e. Spoken English and Fashion Designing. The details of which are available in 1.2.4.

2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

The college organizes occasional workshops, group discussions, special lectures, interactive sessions and seminars which help in sensitizing the staff and students on issues of social relevance. In addition to this, the college has 5 units of NSS, which work in this direction through One- day and Annual Camps and field trips for the participating students. Some departments visit special schools such as Nav Vani, Kiran Society and Jeevan Jyoti. The departments conduct community work programs for mother and child care. Other than this, Home Science department also conducts **Rural Extension Programs** as part of the curriculum. Thrice a week, classes on **Environment Awareness** are held for the students of B.A. III year. **Karate** and **Yoga** workshops are held from time to time. Department of Home Science organizes workshops for the students of UG and PG levels to inform, enlighten and empower them. Our Women's Studies Cell **Udaan** organizes different awareness programmes on domestic violence, women empowerment and

income generation by building small scale industry. Celebration of various days like Republic Day inculcates in staff and students a sense of social responsibility. In 2015-16, *Kartavya Bodh Pakhwara* was organized to sensitize students and staff on cleanliness, energy conservation etc.

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

Students are encouraged to proactively take part in various academic and cultural activities and competitions, youth festival, inter-college competitions, seminars, workshops, creative writing, youth parliament etc.

2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyse and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided)?

There is no separate institutional mechanism for collecting and analysing the data on the academic performance of the students on the verge of dropping out. However we are taking some small steps in the direction of helping the students viz.

- Faculty members constantly provide extra help and assistance to students who are slow learners as and when required.
- Scholarships are given to students for financial assistance and faculty members also personally assist students in different ways (money + books) to enable them to continue their studies further.
- A fund for needy students and staff members has been proposed and will soon come up by the contribution from faculty members.
- There is a book bank for students with financial limitations.
- There are some scholarships which are given to needy students. The corpus fund is generated through donations from alumni and faculty members.

2.3 Teaching – Learning Process

2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue prints, etc.)

Our University provides the Academic Calendar for each academic session – odd & even semesters specifying the teaching days, and dates for semester break, semester exam, marks to be sent by the college and declaration of results. The college also prepares an internal academic calendar in accordance with the calendar sent by BHU to demarcate the dates for various cultural, academic and sports events.

Every faculty implements a time bound teaching-plan decided at the time of the commencement of the academic calendar.

All the faculty members in a department interact and coordinate with each other from time to time, with an intent to evaluate the rate of progress in

teaching and the areas of syllabus covered. At the beginning of the session, the students are apprised about the tentative division of teaching of a particular paper.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching-learning process?

The members of IQAC are invited quite frequently for assisting the departments in planning the academic activities as well as the action plans for improvement of teaching-learning process. In these designs, the members give their considered views in respect of formative tests, their formats, frequencies and nature. This obviously raises the level of the teaching-learning in terms of expectation of the university curriculum being implemented. IQAC also encourages the holding of inter-disciplinary lectures, workshops, field visits and also sports activities for the benefit of students and faculty.

2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

The learning activities encouraged by the various academic programmes are basically learner-centric as students are the major stakeholders in this process of Teaching-Learning & Evaluation. The college and faculty members, as facilitators, provide technological and knowledge-based support to students. Students have full access to the library and ICT in the form of computers and internet facilities available in the computer room. The Library is fully automated and accessible to the students. It has a rich collection of books in all subjects. Students are continuously encouraged by faculty to take part in quiz, group discussions, presentations. In class room seminars and workshops, students make presentations and ask questions. In order to improve their writing skills and independent learning, students are given assignments. Students of Social Science also write dissertation as part of their evaluation process.

2.3.4 How does the Institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into lifelong learners and innovators?

The college follows the vision and philosophy of Dr. Annie Besant, the first President of Theosophical Society (Indian Section) which is reflected in this statement made by Dr. Rohit Mehta –

Our endeavour in the VKM was to link up education with culture While seeing that the higher standards at the academic end are maintained we felt that the girls should imbibe the finest cultural traditions of the land.... Our educational effort was to synthesise tradition with modernity; freedom with responsibility and education as service.

Within the broad framework of the objectives of the college as indicated above, detailed goals are identified in conducting co-curricular and extra-curricular activities. The college aims at imparting education of a holistic nature which empowers different dimensions of the students' personalities. They grow both inwardly as individuals and also as responsible citizens able to serve the community. To achieve this, VKM implements the syllabus

provided by BHU, upholding the ideals and vision of Pt. Madan Mohan Malviya on the one hand and lays distinct stress on a specific set of curricular and extra-curricular activities continuously being managed and monitored at the institutional level for the promotion of the philosophy of Annie Besant. Thus, the endeavour of VKM is to balance the values with the emerging challenges of the globalized world. The college organizes lectures and workshops by eminent scholars on a variety of topics. It has regularly organized seminars on timeless philosophy of India. Through its forum of *Sarjana* and *Udaan* we encourage critical and analytical thinking which would eventually help students grow into lifelong learners and innovators.

2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? eg: Virtual laboratories, e-learning-resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

The college is well-equipped with ICT Support. The college supplements the lecture method of teaching with other learner-centred technological methods like LCD Projectors, Object Cameras, Customized programs for Home Science and Psychology Department, Digital Boards. The English Department has a rich collection of DVDs through which knowledge is imparted to students of both UG and PG for the paper of Drama. Spoken English classes are also conducted through audio-visual aids. The college library has a number of CDs as an e-learning resource. Teachers of various departments use the technique of power-point presentations for effective learning and teaching.

2.3.6 How are the students and Faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, Seminars, Workshops etc?)

The college strongly feels that the growth in the capacity of a faculty generated through research and advanced learning enriches his/her calibre of teaching and nurturing the future generation. In accordance to this the college often organizes seminars, conferences, expert lectures, workshops, field visits with inter-disciplinary thrust. Every faculty member and student gets immensely benefitted from them.

The college also recommends projects and grants leave, whenever necessary, to support both the teaching and the non-teaching staff to complete their research projects.



2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students / benefitted) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counselling / mentoring/ academic advise) provided to students?

Students benefit from the seminars/workshops and guest lectures organized for them. There is a Students Grievance Redressal Committee, which provides personal, psycho-social support. A number of students have also benefitted from career counselling and guidance programmes.

The formative minds of students need constant guidance and counselling in academic and career matters. Their personal problems also need to be addressed. Counselling is also needed to make students aware of the socio-economic political challenges taking place all around.

There is a Guidance & Counselling cell, too, functioning since 2000-2001. The teachers running this cell are from the departments of Psychology, Sociology and Home Science. Hence the tough job of counselling covers in a more scientific manner the areas of academic pursuit, career and adjustment problems.

Objectives:

- To provide proper information on various courses and different careers.
- To provide information on scholarships which are given by various agencies for further studies.

Procedure:

- There is a permanent guidance and counselling cell of 5 experienced teachers.
- For the convenience of students who need counselling, the time-table regarding the duties of counselling cell members are displayed on the notice-board.
- Relevant literature and materials regarding different courses and careers are available in the library and also in Home Science and Psychology Departments for consultation.
- The committee members arrange open sessions and lectures of specialists. Experts from Employment and Guidance Bureau, BHU; Officers from Regional Employment Office, Varanasi; Career Counsellors, Psychologists, Psychotherapists etc. are invited in order to give relevant information to students.
- At the time of admission, BA (Hons.) Part-I students are given academic counselling in the choice of optional subject combinations.

Activity of Counselling & Guidance Cell for 2015-16

Throughout the session, personal counselling and career guidance was provided to the students by the members of the committee. A counselling session on '*Career opportunities for students from different disciplines*' was held on 09.03.2016. Chief Speaker: Dr. Anshu Shukla (Assistant Professor, Department of Home Science, Vasant Kanya Mahavidyalaya).

- The "**LEAD**" programme (1st phase) for inculcating leadership qualities among students was held on 12.09.2015.
- The "**LEAD**" programme (2nd phase) seeking project submissions from students for resource funding was organised on 17.09.2015.
- The final selection of students for taking up projects took place on 20.09.2015. Ms. Priyanka Dey of B.A. II was adjudged the best project formulator.
- A counselling session on '*Career opportunities for students from different disciplines*' was held on 09.03.2016. Chief Speaker was Dr. Anshu Shukla, Assistant Professor, Department of Home Science, Vasant Kanya Mahavidyalaya.
- *The Placement Coordination Cell of Banaras Hindu University* instructed the college *Guidance and Counselling Cell* to collect the bio-data of interested students and provided a sample proforma of resume and registration. The college committee displayed the same on the notice board on 09.10.2015. The application and resume submitted by the students were forwarded to the Placement Coordination Cell, BHU.
- A workshop on '*Global Business: Role of India and China*' was held on Jan 17, 2016, in the Faculty of Management Studies, Banaras Hindu University. 3 students participated in the workshop.
- A workshop was conducted on October, 2015 for B.A. Final year students on the topic "*Role of Personality in the field of making career in Competitive Exams / Job after Graduation*", covering many career fields

like Civil Services, Management, Bank PO, Entrepreneurship, Journalism, Fashion designing etc.

- **Recruitment drive by PRADAN** was held on 05.02.2016 and 06.02.2016. 11 students appeared for the interview.



The College organized a programme on Career Counselling in collaboration with BHU Employment Bureau

2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches / methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faculty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?

The demand of the semester system is that teachers should adopt new methods of teaching besides the traditional method of chalk and talk. Understanding this, our teachers have been using a number of interactive methods which ensure continuous and quality involvement on the part of the students in the class. To cite a few of these methods, group discussions, classroom seminars and presentations, quizzes, are organized and students are encouraged to raise questions. Students are also encouraged by teachers to give their feedback on the method of teaching, content, style etc., so that if needed necessary improvements can be made. This ensures accountability on the part of both the stakeholders, teachers and students. Thus the classroom is no more a one-way flow of information, instead they have become more interactive.

Moreover, the college is also well-equipped with ICT Support. The college supplements the lecture method of teaching with other learner-centred technological methods like LCD Projectors, Object Cameras, customized programs for Home Science and Psychology Departments, Digital Boards. The English Department has a rich collection of DVDs through which knowledge is imparted to students of both UG and PG for the paper of drama. Classes are conducted through audio-visual aids. Teachers of various departments make power-point presentations for effective learning and teaching.

2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

The college has a library with 24723 books, 11 journals, 8 daily newspapers, 2 weekly newspapers, 20 magazines and 79 CDs. Out of which 23041 are text

books and 1682 are reference books. The teachers can access e-journals through NLIST by INFLIBNET.

The library has been fully automated. The automation work, which started in the session 2010-11, was completed in the session 2015-16. The library uses customized programme LIBSYS. After full automation, the titles of books in the library can be easily accessed by the students through computers from anywhere in the college. This has helped in saving the time and energy of the students which was earlier used to access the books manually.

In the Reading Room of the Library, Xerox facility is available on payment basis to the students. Also computers with Wi-Fi connections are also made available so the students can enhance knowledge in concerned fields.

VKM has a rich library furnished with relevant literature and materials regarding different courses and careers. The college has a Library Advisory Committee consisting of Principal, Librarian, teaching staff and student representative. Meetings of the library committee are held from time to time. The committee helps in recommending and purchasing books and renders suggestions for improving the services of the library.

Teachers and staff members regularly encourage students to consult and refer books in the library.

2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

The college follows the curriculum and the academic calendar provided by the affiliating university at the commencement of the new session. With new technological teaching-learning aids and tools, the faculty members successfully complete the curriculum within the planned time-frame and calendar to the satisfaction of the students.

2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

The college has developed a very strong culture of monitoring and evaluating the quality of teaching and learning in each semester. The teacher's role is now being reconceptualised to incorporate a rapport with the community, parents and other stakeholders. The college is engaged in regular dialogue with students, their parents and alumni to identify and explore the basis of meaningful participation and continued interaction with others.

The teachers' performance is further monitored and evaluated through students' feedback. Students' feedback is procured through random sampling. In order that such feedbacks become broad-based, the participator-appraisal technique is used. Such techniques focus on the holistic development of the various segments of the college viz. students-teachers, student-student interaction and teacher-community sharing. A significant piece of feedback device has been experimentally evolved. A committee of faculty members has been formed who are actively associated and involved in this exercise.

Regular students evaluation and monitoring of their learning and grasping is done through quizzes, class seminars, assignments, tests and other academic activities like *Sarjana, Spandan, Udaan* etc. which also analyse their organizational potentials.

In order to attract an eminent faculty, advertisements are given in the national Employment News and other local and national daily newspapers and website of the college. After appointment, the faculties are given attractive salary and allowances as per the UGC/Central government norms. Additional increment for PhD qualified staff has been given.

A cordial staff –management relation exists in the college. The college follows a well-defined charter of rules and functions for its personnel and the staff. Only qualified persons are recruited as teaching and non- teaching staff. They are briefed about their roles to bring about coordination and team spirit among them. On-going training programmes are given to them and are deputed to participate in workshops and conferences, thereby updating their knowledge. Occasionally training programmes are conducted within the college. Services of retired teachers on payment basis are hired as and when available. Staff members are encouraged to upgrade themselves through quality research work and they are supported by good infrastructure and flexible time-table.

The use of innovative teaching tools and methods like LCDs, ICT, group discussions, projects etc. contribute to create interest and enthusiasm for learning in students. The Principal also conducts academic audit using feedback from the students. The teachers are given full freedom to enrich their knowledge through seminars and orientation programmes. The college follows the self – appraisal method and student feedback system to evaluate the performance of the faculty. It encourages the teachers to participate in self-enriching courses whenever different institutions organise them. The teachers

are also encouraged and motivated to interact with the neighbouring teaching faculty members for consultation and learning of innovative teaching techniques.

2.4.2 How does the institution cope with the growing demand / scarcity of qualified senior faculty to teach new programmes / modern areas (emerging areas) of study being introduced (Biotechnology, IT, Bioinformatics etc.)? Provide details on the efforts made by the institution in this direction and the outcome during the last three years.

Special guest lectures are organized by various departments from time to time. Faculty members are also encouraged continuously to upgrade knowledge through seminars, workshops and training programmes. The college has organized three National Seminars between 2012-2016. To cope with the growing demand and scarcity of senior faculty to teach new programmes and modern and emerging areas of study being introduced, the college invites eminent Professors/ Personalities from other Universities and Institutions to deliver lectures for the benefit of both teachers and students. A list of such lectures has already been cited under 2.3.6.

- The college has evolved a policy/ system of providing study leave, support for research and academic publications, teaching experience in other institutions of repute, in order to develop expertise among its faculty members.
- It has constantly encouraged faculty to participate in National and International Conferences, Seminars, Symposiums, Workshops, training programmes etc. They are given duty leave for this purpose.
- The teaching staff is encouraged to publish research papers in reputed journals, organize seminars, guest lectures for students and faculty members, and work on projects.

- The college also supports the non-teaching staff to upgrade their skills and multi-tasking abilities. A computer awareness training programme was conducted for them. Lectures on organizational behaviour for teaching and non-teaching staff are conducted from time to time.
- Yoga sessions are also promoted in order to enhance their concentration.
- A well-equipped library of the college with numerous books, journals, e-journals and magazines helps faculty members to access information which motivates them to improve their teaching techniques.

2.4.6 Has the institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external Peers? If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teaching-learning process?

- Students' feedback are taken and analysed by the Feedback Committee of the college in each session and faculty members, library and office staff are also advised accordingly for better performance.
(Please refer to Annexure 5 for Feedback Analysis)
- The college follows the “Performance Based Assessment System (PBAS) as per UGC/BHU norms. The University has developed an Academic Performance Indicator (API) system which is based on PBAS system developed by the UGC. The API is divided into three categories-
(i) Teaching, learning and evaluation related activities.
(ii) Co-curricular, extension and professional development related activities.
(iii) Research, Publications, awards received, academic contributions etc.

These API scores are presented to the university authorities at the time of promotion under Career Advancement Scheme (CAS). The promotion of all teaching staff and librarian is done under CAS (Career Advancement Scheme) based on PBAS (Performance Based Assessment System) developed by UGC. These promotions are confirmed by the Management Committee.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

The students are informed at the very beginning of each session that their performance will be evaluated through written tests, assignments, quiz and viva voce (wherever applicable). They are acquainted with the pattern of the semester examination with respect to distribution of marks regarding internal

and external examinations. The examination process follows a transparent method. Marks are duly displayed for the benefit of the students and also their grievances addressed. The university also provides for the display of answer sheets to the students who apply for the same through an established procedure.

Teachers are made aware of the evaluation process prescribed by the University; any change made to it is communicated to all stake-holders at the very beginning of the session by the Principal and the IQAC. Teachers formulate an evaluation procedure and its time period in consultation with other faculty members of their own department and also from other departments.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

The college follows the examination and evaluation pattern of the University. The University prescribes evaluation at two levels – Internal & External. Tests, assignments, presentations, seminars, exhibitions and field trips form part of the internal evaluation and end-semester examinations are part of external evaluation.

The college strictly adheres to the evaluation process prescribed by the affiliating university. At the beginning of the session, the students are informed about the process of their evaluation. The College Committee and IQAC, along with Principal, hold meetings with teachers to formulate the schedule of internal evaluation, keeping in view the academic calendar of the university.

Some departments evaluate the students' knowledge on the basis of field trips, exhibitions and other methods of experimental learning.

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

- I. The College Committee and IQAC, along with the Principal, hold meetings with teachers to formulate the schedule of internal evaluation, keeping in view the academic calendar of the university.
- II. Students are informed about the evaluation procedure and the academic calendar of the university at the beginning of each session through orientation programmes specially designed for them.
- III. Marks of internal and external assessments are duly displayed on the students' notice board.
- IV. To ensure transparency in evaluation system, answer sheets are shown to the students as per their requirement.
- V. The marks awarded in internal and external assessments are uploaded online on the BHU students' portal well in time.

2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative assessment approaches adopted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

The formative assessment (having a weightage of 30%) approach as followed by the college is broadly reflected in the following table:

The quiz sessions have encouraged a speedy internalization of the concepts explained to students in their respective classes. Presentations, seminars and viva are frequently used by the faculty members, thereby raising the level of motivation and involvement of students in the teaching-learning process. The field trips and exhibitions organized by the concerned departments have developed a strong basis for promoting experiential learning among students. The summative assessment (having a weightage of 70%) involves examinations as directed by the University. The marks are duly displayed and copies can be accessed by the students if needed, thus ensuring transparency in the evaluation system.

2.5.5 Details on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioural aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.)

With the introduction of the semester system, the evaluation process has undergone a tremendous change. Under the annual system, marks of internal tests, presentations, quiz sessions etc. were not included in the marksheets. However, under the semester system, tests, assignments etc. are an inevitable part of the students' internal assessment. This has ensured more sincerity and enthusiasm towards attending classes and ingraining the topics taught to them in the classes.

Internal assessment procedure is totally transparent with students able to access their answer sheets and discuss their performances with their subject teachers. This helps students to realize their capabilities and incapacities, hence encouraging them to work harder to make themselves a better learner with the help of their teachers.

With the introduction of presentations, seminars, quiz and field trips/educational tours in internal assessment, students have become more pro-active, have developed communication skills. They are consulting more books (text-books & reference books), journals and e-journals to prepare their assignments.

2.5.6 What are the graduate attributes specified by the college/ affiliating university? How does the college ensure the attainment of these by the students?

As stated by Albert Einstein *“Education is what remains after one has forgotten what one has learnt in school”*, the college aims at the inculcation of certain lofty attributes among the students. The college endeavours to promote the vision of Dr. Annie Besant- *Tradition with Modernity, Freedom with Responsibility* and *Education as Service*- through extra and co-curricular activities besides the regular teaching schedule.

The college regularly organizes sports activities, yoga classes, cultural programmes through its cultural forum ‘*Sarjana*’; gender sensitization and women empowerment programmes under the banner of women cell ‘*Udaan*’. To create awareness towards various social causes and to nurture in them a sense of social responsibility, programmes are organized through 5 units of NSS (National Service Scheme).

2.5.7 What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the college and University level?

The internal marks of formative assessment are displayed on notice board and the students have the right to view their answer sheets. Grievance, if any, is solved at the level of the college by the concerned department and teacher. For summative evaluation, the students can view their answer sheets in the concerned department of the University.

If there is any grievance, it is addressed accordingly. As per University rules, the policy of rechecking of an answer sheet is followed.

2.6. Student performance and Learning Outcomes

The college run by the Besant Education Fellowship inherits the spirit enkindled by Dr. Annie Besant, a great nationalist leader and the first President of the Theosophical Society (Indian Section). Its founder, Dr. Rohit Mehta, a renowned thinker and a frontline theosophist, became instrumental to make that spirit evident in the entire ambience of the college. The college is able to sustain and strengthen that spirit as it has the good fortune of being *“admitted to the privileges of Banaras Hindu University”*. This esteemed position enables the college to be a part and parcel of Mahamana Pt. Madan Mohan Malaviya’s mission also. To be precise, the vision of the great builders of the nation, i.e., Dr. Annie Besant and the Mahamana happens to be our inspiration.

In order to impart a goal-oriented education, a holistic view on learning and teaching has been worked out. A teaching methodology, along with co-curricular and extra-curricular activities, has been designed to create a strong base to develop an integrated personality in the students. VKM endeavours to balance the values with the emerging challenges of the globalized world.

The students are sensitized and made aware of the visions, goals and objectives with which VKM was founded through orientation programmes organized at the very beginning of each session, through discussions and workshops. The cultural and academic forum of the college *Sarjana* plays an integral role in enhancing the overall development of students' personalities. Besides *Sarjana*, a number of other forums like *Udaan* (Women's Cell), *Vagvardhini-Sabha*, *Sanskrit Matri-Mandalam*, *Sports*, *NSS*, *NCC*, *Annie Besant Progression Spirit*, further assist in making both students and teachers aware of the goals and objectives which form an integral part of the learning outcomes of the college.

2.6.2 Enumerate on how the institution monitors and communicates the progress and performance of students through the duration of the course/programme? The institution monitors and communicates the progress and performance of students through the results declared by the University.

- The progress of the students is monitored through tests, assignments, quiz, presentations, classroom seminars, practicals etc.
- Marks of internal and external assessments are duly displayed on the students' notice-board.
- To ensure transparency in the evaluation system, answer sheets are shown to the students as per their requirement.
- The marks awarded in internal and external assessments are uploaded online on the BHU students' portal well in time.

2.6.4 What are the measures / initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (student placements, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude developed among students etc.) of the courses offered?

The college has a guidance & counselling cell and a placement cell with a view to enhance awareness among students regarding career opportunities available to them in their respective fields of specialization. *For details please refer to 2.3.7 for the activities of Guidance & Counselling Cell.*

- In order to meet the challenges of stiff competition and economic pressures generated by today's dynamic organizations, students are encouraged to develop and hone their own entrepreneurial skills in diverse fields such as fashion-designing, food presentation, textiles, dress- making, fabric-painting, handicrafts, language translations and diagnostic testing in hospitals and related institutions.
- Frequent visits by students to different organizations, invited guest lectures and interactive sessions with experts, participation in NGOs are some of the ways to empower students to envisage and generate self-employment ensuring economic security and self-reliance.

- Inspired and motivated by these efforts, some of our students are successfully engaged in running their own boutiques and providing personal grooming services, diagnostic testing services, aiding disabled children, etc.
- Informal guidance is provided to students to assist them in preparing for competitive examinations. Approximately fifty percent students appear for UGC-NET and half of them qualify it. Some students appear for Civil Services and banking examinations also.
- The college library is well-equipped with newspapers and competitive magazines to facilitate relevant learning.
- Computer and internet facilities are also available.
- Although it is difficult to keep track of all the students' further academic pursuits after they leave college, some information is made available through alumni and personal contacts.

2.6.5 How does the institution collect and analyse data on student performance and learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?

The college follows a semester system. In each semester, periodical evaluation of the knowledge and grasp of student is obtained through summative and formative assessments. Regular assessment of students' performance is made through tests, assignments, practical & viva, presentations, classroom seminars, quiz sessions. Teachers get an idea of their students' strengths and weaknesses. This identification helps teachers to plan their teaching techniques accordingly and thus overcome the barriers of learning.

On the basis of this assessment, those students are identified who need special attention and more time on the part of the teachers. As such, the college had organized remedial classes funded by UGC in the year 2011-12, in the subjects English, History, Economics, Psychology and AIHC & Archaeology. However, the college continues to organize regular personal tutorial classes for academically weak students.

2.6.6 How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes?

The college monitors the achievement of learning outcomes of the students through classroom interaction, tests, assignments, quiz sessions, group discussions, presentations, classroom seminars, practicals, viva etc.

To ensure the achievement of learning outcomes, regular classes are held, tutorial classes are organized, remedial coaching is provided to weak students, seminars, workshops, guest lectures, field visits, exhibitions are organized from time to time.

Besides these academic activities, the college regularly organizes extra-curricular activities through 'Sarjana' (cultural forum), 'Udaan' (women's cell), NSS, Sports etc.

The college follows a semester system. In each semester, periodical evaluation of the knowledge and grasp over the subject by the student is obtained through summative and formative assessments. Through this assessment, teachers identify the strength and weaknesses of the students. This identification helps teachers to plan their teaching techniques.

On the basis of this assessment, those students are identified who need special attention and more time of teachers. As such, the college had organized remedial classes funded by UGC in the year 2011-12, in the subjects English, History, Economics, Psychology and AIHC & Archaeology. However, the college continues to organize regular personal tutorial classes for academically weak students.

Recognising the importance of research and extension activities in higher education, the college has constituted a Project Committee to promote, coordinate and monitor research activities. The committee consists of senior faculty members.

The composition of the Project Research Committee is as follows:

1. Chairperson : Principal
2. Members : Senior Faculty members

The major function of the Committee is:

All minor or major research projects are put before the committee through power- point presentations. Committee members make suggestions, if required, and after due compliance it is forwarded to the funding agency-UGC, ICSSR or others.

Other functions are:

- * To develop an aptitude for research among faculty and students.
- * To encourage faculty and students to write research papers and proposals and publish the same in national/international journals.
- * To encourage faculty members to participate in national /international seminars and present papers.

RECOMMENDATIONS MADE BY THE COMMITTEE:

The committee gives recommendation after presentations made by the researcher before sending the major/minor project proposals to concerned agencies. From 2009-16, the committee considered and recommended two major and three minor research projects to funding agencies like UGC and ICSSR.

Impact of the Recommendations of the Research Committee:-

One major and two minor research projects have been completed by faculty members.

- Collaborations with different institutions / organizations like IIHT, DTU, IICT, IFT, KVIC have been established.
- Interdisciplinary seminars have been organized which has given impetus for further research.

Measures for Smooth research:

1. **Autonomy to Principal Investigator-** A large number of issues have been left at the discretion of principal investigator (PI) such as research design and equipments to be used in the research project. The PI takes all the decisions regarding his/her Research Project- Minor / Major.
2. **Timely availability and release of resources:** The college releases the fund on the written requisition of principal investigator or furnishing of bills and also gives advance for field work as per funding agency norms – UGC, ICSSR, etc.
3. **Adequate infrastructure & human resources:** This is a challenging issue but the management has been successfully providing basic amenities in the form of equipment, appliances, laboratory and manpower. In this regard, the overhead charges and specific grants from the projects, included in them, have assisted to a large extent. The college has adequate infrastructure in terms of well-equipped library, resource accession through INFLIBNET (NLIST) facilities, and computer internet. Under the major projects, there is a provision for appointment of research fellows who are duly selected and paid as per the norms of the funding agency – UGC, etc.
4. **Time-off, reduced teaching load, special leave etc. to teachers**
Since it is necessary to focus on research- based teaching, the college management tries to balance between research and routine duty. Duty leave is provided as and when needed for the same.
5. **Support in terms of technology and information needs**
In an era of ICT, the college has Wi-Fi facility and access is provided to teachers to facilitate them in their research work. The college has a common computer lab along with departmental ones.
6. **Facilitate timely auditing and submission of utilization certificate to the funding authorities:** The college has a facility of internal audit through the office of principal. The utilization certificate, duly audited by CA and processed by the college office is submitted to the funding agency well within time. The remaining grant, if any, is released by the funding agency after receipt of utilization certificate.

3.1.4 What are the efforts made by the institution in developing scientific temper and research culture and aptitude among students?

The introduction of research methodology as a core course for the undergraduate and post-graduate programmes and the requirement to submit a project/dissertation for the award of the degree as specified in the revised curriculum have a positive impact and promote the aptitude for research in the campus. The college has taken several steps to intensify research zeal amongst students:

- Motivating and guiding undergraduate and post-graduate students to take up research topics in emerging areas to prepare their project/dissertation.
- Enhancing library facilities by including research studies by eminent researchers to the existing stock, subscribing to national research journals and provision of free access to internet.
- Involving research scholars and post-graduate students in all the processes concerning research activities including organizing seminars, paper presentations etc.
- Arranging workshops and classes on research methodology by external experts.
- Organising National /State/College level seminars in emerging areas to arouse curiosity among the students as well as to get a chance to meet academic experts of the related areas.
- Students are further encouraged to visit departments of universities and colleges for exposure to advanced research.
- Subject exhibitions are organized by various departments which promote scientific temper.
- Final year UG and PG students in some departments study research methodology through dissertation.
- Apart from classroom teaching, in order to inculcate a scientific temper, socio-economic surveys are conducted and educational tours taken by UG students to villages and national level institutions like IICT, IIHT, IPS, DLW etc.
- The college has developed class-rooms comprising LCD projector, computer and laptop, interactive boards, object cameras to make teaching more effective.
- Apart from this, facilities like Wi-Fi, Internet, computer lab and rich library exist in the college to encourage and assist students in research activities.

Guiding student research- The college implements student research activities in the form of projects/dissertations in post-graduate and undergraduate programmes. About 70% of the faculty members are involved in active research and are guiding UG and PG students in the preparation of projects/dissertation.5 Departments with PG programmes also offer Ph.D. Twenty faculty members are research supervisors and fifty-seven students are registered under them.

3.1.9 What percentage of the faculty has utilized Sabbatical Leave for research activities? How has the provision contributed to improve the quality of research and imbibe research culture on the campus?

Faculty members are allowed to go on 3-4 weeks leave for attending orientation / refresher courses. Duty leave for attending library and seminars is also granted as per UGC norms. However, since departments have only 3-5 faculties, the staff is generally not encouraged to avail long leave as it will have a negative impact on the teaching-learning process.

- Providing facilities for promoting research activities among faculty and students.
- Encouraging students and teachers to present research papers in conferences and seminars.

- The college does not only focus on a prioritized research area but encourages interdisciplinary research.
- ICT training and computer learning have enhanced research skill among students and staff.
- The surveys conducted by research scholars from various departments provide valuable inputs to the concerned authorities in policy formulation.

- In social sciences, the findings of the research project are communicated to the funding agency which is usually UGC & ICSSR and it is expected that the findings would be useful for policy-making.

3.2 RESOURCE MOBILIZATION FOR RESEARCH

3.2.1 What percentage of the total budget is earmarked for research? Give details of major heads of expenditure, financial allocation and actual utilization.

There is no exclusive budget head earmarked for research. However, financial assistance from the College Management is used for creating research facilities and infrastructure in the campus. Apart from this, the college receives research grants through major/minor research projects from funding agencies like UGC and ICSSR. The college has also received grants from UGC for purchase / up-gradation of equipments and also for organizing National Seminars which also facilitate research. The college has received grant from ICPR for organising lectures on International Philosophy Day.

The challenges faced in organizing interdisciplinary research and programmes are lack of funds and infrastructure. There is also an inadequate number of staff because the college follows the semester system of its affiliating University.

- Since the college has limited number of classrooms having IT facilities, the departments exchange the classrooms as and when required.

The college does not receive any special grant from the industry. 3.3 Research Facilities

3.3.1 What are the research facilities available to the students and research scholars within the campus?

The college has a consistent good record regarding the participation of students in research. The college encourages students, research scholars and faculty for research activities and provides facilities for research development such as:

- * Class Room equipped with LCD projectors, Object Camera, interactive boards etc.
- * Wi-Fi connection
- * Reading Room

3.3.2 What are the institutional strategies for planning, upgrading and creating infrastructural facilities to meet the needs of researchers especially in the new and emerging areas of research?

- The college motivates teachers and students to organize seminars, workshops and lectures on new trends of research.
- Duty leave is sanctioned to the teachers to attend various seminars, conferences, courses and workshops.

- The college motivates the teachers to deliver lectures on various platforms on emerging trends of research.
- The college has subscribed to national and international and online journals of repute.
- Soliciting students/researchers feedback in purchase of textbooks and reference books.
- Purchase of computers and laptops and specially designed software like SPSS.
- Wi-Fi connectivity.

3.3.3 Has the institution received any special grants or finances from the industry or other beneficiary agency for developing research facilities?? If ‘yes’, what are the instruments / facilities created during the last four years.

The college does not receive any special grant for developing research facility from industry. It submits its budgetary requirements to the UGC and UGC regularly disburses assistance and special assistance grants to the college. One such grant was received by the college in 2012-13 in the form of UGC “Special Assistance Grant” under OBC Fund.

3.3.4 What are the research facilities made available to the students and research scholars outside the campus / other research laboratories?

Research scholars can access the departmental and central library of BHU and other national libraries. Cyber Library of BHU is another source for quality research. Students consult various other libraries such as National Library of Kolkata, IFLU Hyderabad, British Council, Lucknow, Osmania University, Hyderabad etc as and when required. The students access the laboratory of Indian Institute of Handloom Technology (IIHT), Chowkaghat, Varanasi, and Cognitive Science laboratory, BHU if required.

3.3.5 Provide details on the library/ information resource centre or any other facilities available specifically for the researchers?

The college has an updated library with 24723 titles, 11 journals, 8 daily newspapers, 2 weekly newspapers and 79 CDs and a subscription to N-LIST by INFLIBNET.

The college library consists of reference books, text books, journals, seminar proceedings, etc. These books and journals are referred to by faculties, research scholars and PG students of different departments for preparation of research proposals, writing papers and theses. The college library has been automated and the catalogue can be accessed digitally too. The library has a reading-cum-reference section which has a capacity of approximately 50 students.

3.3.6 What are the collaborative research facilities developed / created by the research institutes in the college? For ex. Laboratories, library, instruments, computers, new technology etc.

The college has the facility for collaborative research. Students are provided laboratory facilities through collaborative institutions like Delhi Technical University; Ramakrishna Mission, Luxa, Varanasi; Indian Institute of Carpet

Technology, Bhadohi; Indian Institute of Handloom Technology, Chowkaghat, Varanasi; NITRA Centre, Varanasi; Cognitive Science laboratory, BHU.

Training about new technology, instruments for power loom design is provided to students in Institute of Professional Studies, Allahabad. Sri Niketan; Sri Sai Institute, Varanasi; Weaver Service Centre, Varanasi; Deptt. of Community Medicine, IMS, BHU; Food Preservation Centre, BHU and Bhojubeer are some of the other centers that provide opportunity for collaborative research to students.

The UGC also assisted the college by providing funds that were used by departments to purchase equipments, enrich library, purchase computers along with customized software and provide internet facility, create smart-rooms etc.

The college does not have a publication division. However, it publishes a College Magazine at regular intervals. The college has also published the proceedings of 6 UGC sponsored National Seminars. A magazine committee has been specifically instituted by the college for bringing out a college magazine annually, promoting and highlighting students' activities in the form of originally written articles, poems, stories, etc. in English, Hindi and Sanskrit languages. This valuable work is co-ordinated

by students and the Magazine Committee consisting of the Principal as patron, one senior faculty member as chief editor, two as sub-editors, and few as members of editorial board. *(Please refer to 5.1.4 for details)*

The college has also published a booklet *Yug Chetna* to propagate the values championed by Dr. Annie Besant and Pt. Madan Mohan Malaviya , the spirit behind VKM and BHU.

3.6.2 What is the Institutional mechanism to track students' involvement in various social movements / activities which promote citizenship roles?

The college is responsive to the needs of the community and it has set up a sound mechanism to track students' involvement in various social activities. The Principal, teachers and staff are actively involved in implementing, monitoring and evaluating programs conducted by NSS, Udaan and other committees to keep a track of activities of students. Apart from this, a report of the activities carried out is published in the annual college magazine entitled "Vasantshree". Those students who attend seven-day NSS camps are awarded with certificates and they get weightage in admission in other state universities. This mechanism ensures active participation of the students in various activities which promote citizenship roles of the students.

3.6.3 How does the institution solicit stakeholder perception on the overall performance and quality of the institution?

The stakeholders comprise students, parents, alumni, local community and staff members. The college solicits stakeholder perception on the overall performance and quality of education imparted in the college through feedback from students, alumni and parents' meet. On Annual Day, Sports Day, Alumni Meet, the various stakeholders visit the college and provide suggestion for improvement of the college. These inputs are discussed in the meetings of the principal with the heads of the departments and appropriate measures are initiated. This gives the scope for further improvement of the college.

The college values the opinions and needs of its students. Two students of each class are elected as representatives. They communicate the students' requirements and problems to the respective teachers, department and / or principal. Suggestion / complaint boxes are placed at various places on the campus which are accessible to students. Students have the freedom to approach the principal during working hours without prior appointment. As far as parents are concerned, teachers/principal/office staff interact with them regularly. They are informed about their wards' academic performance and attendance records through meetings, letters, phone calls and SMS. The opinions of parents on various aspects, such as planning of industrial/other campus visits, cultural programmes etc. are valued. Parents can meet the principal, teachers and office staff on any working day without prior appointment. Staff members are the pillars on whom the college rests, as such, their opinion is regularly sought on the functioning of the college through formal and informal meetings. Two teachers' representatives are in the management committee. VKM has a long list of luminous alumni and their opinion is sought through alumni meets and informal person to person talks or telephonic talks. VKM has always benefited from the vast and rich experience of its alumni.

Besides this, the IQAC also has alumni, representatives of local industry/community and students along with office staff and one member from management committee as its members. In the meetings of the IQAC, members discuss issues concerning the overall performance and betterment of the college.

They not only spread awareness regarding hygiene and cleanliness but also cleaned up the areas. • A yoga training workshop, rally to spread awareness, road-play and literary, music and fine arts competitions were also held in the camp.

Dr. Anshu Shukla, Assistant Professor, Department of Home Science, Vasant Kanya Mahavidyalaya, presented her views on 'Yuva Shakti Jagriti' on the occasion. • A seven-day camp was organised from 04.02.2016 to 10.02.2016. Volunteers of all the five units visited slum areas of Bajardiha, Khojawan, Kirahiya, Sudamapur and Sarainandan and not only spread awareness regarding hygiene and cleanliness but also cleaned up the areas. • A workshop on Yoga and Taekwondo, rally to spread awareness regarding cleanliness, a road-play on 'Beti Bachao, Beti Padhao', and various competitions in events like sports, literature, slogan making, poster making, music and fine arts were held in the camp. Volunteers also distributed food, clothes, pens, pencils and books in the slum areas that they visited.
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The budget for NSS activities is provided by the NSS Unit of BHU. It is Rs.1200/-per unit for 1 day camp, Rs.22500/- per unit for 7 day camp. Program Officers are allocated pocket allowance of Rs. 3000/- per annum. The total budget is around Rs. 1,33,500/- .

Students of the college participated in the “Model UN Conference” organized by IIT, BHU, from 5.9.2014 to 7.9.2014 as representative-members, and obtained certificates by impressively presenting their views on topics given to them 24 hours before the presentation.

The "LEAD" programme (1st phase) for inculcating leadership qualities among students was held on 12.09.2015. The "LEAD" programme (2nd phase) seeking project submissions from students for resource funding was organised on 17.09.2015. The final selection of students for taking up projects took place on 20.09.2015. Ms. Priyanka Dey of B.A. II was adjudged the best project formulator.

Besides this, the Departments of Home Science, Psychology and Sociology regularly engage in extension activities.

All these activities go hand in hand with the academic activities. This brings in a new curriculum-extension interface which has immense personality development value and plays a pivotal role in developing a responsible youth force in the country.

There is no separate budgetary provision for extension activities.



3.6.5 How does the institution promote the participation of students and faculty in extension activities including participation in NSS, NCC, YRC and other National/ International agencies?

The college prepares the academic calendar for the whole year. Fixed dates for various programmes are announced well in advance and propagated among the students. The students are encouraged to participate in all the activities in good number, under the guidance of teachers. Participation in extension activities are promoted among students as well as faculties. There are no designated officers of NSS in the college, college teachers take the responsibility of NSS and it is an additional charge for them. However, UGC gives due weightage to faculties conducting NSS programmes. Through the NSS camps, students participate in rural development, adult education, health and hygiene. Those who attend seven-day special camps are awarded certificates and get weightage in admission in state universities. This mechanism ensures active participation of the students in various activities which promote the citizenship roles of the students.

The faculty is also promoted to take part in extension activities. They deliver lectures in NSS and other relevant programmes. They are actively working in collaboration with other organizations like Theosophical Order of Service, SARC etc.

The Theosophical Order of Service in India (TOS) (1908), Varanasi is registered under The Registration of Societies Act 1860. It is a charitable Institution, with the objectives of:-

1. To minimize the sum total of misery in the world.
2. To forget self in working for others.

Extension Activities of TOS

Dr.Kumud Ranjan and Dr.Rachna Srivastava also collaborated with **SARC** (*Social Action and Research Centre*), Varanasi. SARC works against child sexual abuse.

3.6.6 Give details on social surveys, research or extension work (if any) undertaken by the college to ensure social justice and empower students from under-privileged and vulnerable sections of society?

- The extension work done by NSS is an effort to ensure social justice. The extension activities of NSS are given in detail under 3.6.1 and 3.6.4.
- The students impart training in the NGOs, which enables them to empower persons from the under-privileged sections of the society.
- A number of students are trained for entrepreneurship through various workshops conducted in the home science department and during annual exhibition of home science. They are encouraged to sell their products and earn profit.
- The department of home science also organises an *Earn while you Learn* programme “**HUNAR**” every year, to promote entrepreneurial skills among students. In this unique programme, skilled students of home science train unskilled students of other departments of VKM and charge fees for providing this service. The programme “**HUNAR**” boosts their self-confidence and improves their financial condition to some extent.
- To ensure social justice and empower students from under-privileged and vulnerable sections of society, the college has provided maximum concession in payment of their tuition fees as per government rules and

maximum time limit to pay their fees. The UP government provides scholarship to students from weaker sections of the society.

- Students from Poddar Andh Vidyalaya, participated and presented programs in the Republic Day celebrations of the college. This move has initiated sensitiveness towards persons with disability. Also, the departments of psychology and home science are continuously engaged with various institutes of Varanasi which cater to the needs of differently-abled.

3.6.7 Reflecting on objectives and expected outcomes of the extension activities organized by the institution, comment on how they complement students' academic learning experience and specify the values and skills inculcated.

Extension activities conducted by the college help students, as well as faculty imbibe academic learning experience, values and skills. These activities refresh the environment of the institute as well. The major strength of this college is its ability to ensure holistic development of students. The college is an 'equal opportunity' institution established to provide knowledge and quality education to all sections of society. It aims to maintain a modern outlook with contemporary developments without compromising moral values. It provides a knowledge and quality-based education to students by inculcating moral values, scientific temper in them. It aims to pursue excellence towards creating manpower with high degree of intellectual, professional and cultural development to meet the national and global challenges.

Outcome:

The participation of students and teachers in the various socially relevant activities has resulted in inculcating the feeling of being socially awakened citizens. The students who have been part of this process, spread awareness and motivate other students as well to stand tall for the cause of social upliftment. NSS camps educate the students on social evils like dowry, female infanticide, illiteracy and lack of cleanliness etc.

- Dr.Kumud Ranjan and Dr.Rachna Srivastava also collaborated with *SARC(Social Action and Research Centre)*, Varanasi. SARC works against child sexual abuse.
- Students visit Deva Centre for special children and interacted with the children. They also visit Kiran Centre which houses orthopedically challenged children. Students and faculty, encourage such children by purchasing products made by them.
- The college established an association with Red Ribbon Club and organized Blood Donation camps.
- In 2015-16, the college in collaboration with the Grain Bank of Varanasi, established a Grain Bank in the college. The college staff and students generously contributed to it.

3.7 Collaboration

The college has developed facilities for collaborative research. Students are provided laboratory facilities through collaborative institutions, like Delhi Technical University; Rama Krishna Mission, Luxa, Varanasi; Indian Institute of Carpet Technology, Bhadohi; Indian Institute of Handloom Technology, Chowkaghat; NITRA Centre, Varanasi.

Training of new technology, instruments for power loom design is provided to students in Institute of Professional Studies, Allahabad. Sri Niketan; Sri Sai Institute, Varanasi; Weaver Service Centre, Varanasi; Deptt. of Community Medicine, IMS, BHU; Food Preservation Centre, BHU & Bhojubeer are some of the other centers that provide opportunity for collaborative research to students.

UGC also assisted the college by providing funds that were used by departments to purchase equipments, enrich library, purchase computers, customized softwares and provide internet facility, etc.

- The Institution has a formal MoU with Sai Institute of Rural Development, Varanasi since August 2015. But even before that, since 2009 the department of Home Science is associated with SIRD for research and extension activities.
- The college has a formal MoU with GV Meditech and Galaxy hospital, to cater to the health needs of major stakeholders(staff and students). This is a cashless facility for stakeholders provided at CGHS rate.
- The department of Home Science has informal collaborative arrangements with Indian Institute of Handloom Technology, Chowkaghat; Indian Institute of Carpet Technology, Bhadohi; Weavers Service Centre and Delhi Technical University, Delhi, where PG and Ph.D. students go for conducting lab experiments.
- Experts from various Institutes have extended their expertise in terms of symposia, seminars, lectures, training etc. which benefit our students and faculty and stimulate their research aptitude.

The students and faculty of the college have immensely benefitted from their interactions with industry and community. The mission of the college, "Education as Service", is fully realised only with the interaction of the students and faculty with the community. They gain fruitful experience from such interactions.

The IQAC of the college has members from industry and community. These members provide valuable inputs for the up-gradation of academic and infrastructural facilities of the college.

The placement cell of the college, though not functioning as in professional colleges, has been able to attract local industries/ NGOs etc. for placement of students.

A formal MoU with Sai Institute of Rural Development, Varanasi has been signed in August 2015 for research, consultancy and extension purposes. The college has a formal MoU with GV Meditech and Galaxy hospital, to cater to the health needs of major stakeholders(staff and students). This is a cashless facility for stakeholders provided at CGHS rate. Two MoUs are in the pipeline with KVIC, Varanasi, and exchanges have been taking place informally regarding listed activities:

- (a) **Curriculum development/ enrichment** - Faculties are members of board of studies, member of academic council etc.
- (b) **Internship** -Formal MoU with SIRD and Saumya Creation has been signed for the internship of students.
- (c) As per the curriculum, students of Home Science PG course undergo internship in various institutes and industries every year viz. Saumya Productions, Lahartara, Varanasi; Institute of Fashion Technology, Allahabad; Shreeniketan, Patia, Sunderpur, Varanasi; Rangotri dyers, Jaipur; Rekha garments, Calcutta; Indian Institute of Handloom Technology, Chaukaghat, Varanasi.
- (d) **Summer placement-**
Students attended training (Summer training/internship) sponsored by Ministry of Textiles at IIHT, Chowkaghat, Varanasi from 15 May, 2013 to 10 July, 2013, on Weaving Technology and Computer aided designs for weaving with stipend of Rs. 2500/-. (*See Annexure 9 for list of beneficiaries*)
- (e) **Research**— PG and PhD students of Home Science visit SIRD for research .These collaborations help in upgrading their research through enhanced facilities, well equipped laboratories, and other technological advancements.
- (f) **Consultancy--** MoU with SIRD is signed for consultancy services also.
- (g) **Extension**—SIRD
- (h) **Student placement** - These collaborations have given an opportunity to students for better placements. Approximately, 15 students are working as freelance designers, 6 as teachers in Navodaya Fashion Design Institute, 10-12 as designers and approximately 58 as teachers in various degree colleges and schools.

4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 What is the policy of the institution for creation and enhancement of infrastructure that facilitate effective teaching and learning?

Higher education is the key to fulfill intensive and extensive knowledge requirements for research and development. Infrastructure (especially technological infrastructure in the present knowledge era) plays a great role (as a tool) to achieve excellence in teaching and research. In order to create and enhance the infrastructure that facilitates effective teaching and learning, the policy is framed according to the strength of students in different streams. With the increase in strength, as per requirement, the institution approaches UGC and seeks various funds. The Institution gets financial assistance from UGC under every plan. In the XI Plan, a provision was made to enhance some basic facilities in the teaching-learning process like purchase of books and equipments. The infrastructural enhancement is liberally funded on need base and on the availability of the funds. Moreover, at the institutional level, it is our constant endeavor to do as much as we can for the creation and enhancement of infrastructure that facilitates effective teaching and learning. The college has developed techniques to make teaching more effective. Apart from this, facilities like Wi-Fi, Internet, computer lab and an enriched library are available in the institution to encourage and assist students in learning. All developmental plans are put before the Management Committee, through the Building Committee, which consists of members as per UGC norms.

4.1.2 Detail the facilities available for

- a) **Curricular and co-curricular activities – classrooms, technology enabled learning spaces, seminar halls, tutorial spaces, laboratories, botanical garden, Animal house, specialized facilities and equipment for teaching, leaning and research etc.**
- b) **Extra-curricular activities–sports, outdoor and indoor games, gymnasium, auditorium, NSS, NCC, cultural activities, Public speaking, communication skills development, yoga, health and hygiene etc.**

(A) Curricular and Co-Curricular activities:

- The college gets major funding for creation and up-gradation of physical infrastructure from the UGC under 'Non Salary head' on an annual basis. The requirements of the college are assessed at the departmental level and these are subsequently included in the college's plan proposal. The management also provides fund for upkeep and minor maintenance activities from time to time.
- 10 Classrooms, 1 Staff room, 1 Conference Hall, 1 Computer Lab, 1 Common room, 1 Canteen have been constructed by the college. The college received grant for renovation/ construction of buildings from UGC through BHU under the implementation of the OBC reservation policy. A number of steps have been taken to renovate classrooms, lab, office etc. to improve the effectiveness of teaching and other academic activities. The classrooms have the provisions of LCD projector, portable

LCD projectors, multimedia learning, object camera, interactive board, Wi-Fi connectivity and internet access.

- **Seminar Hall:** The college has one well-equipped seminar hall. This hall is regularly used for conducting college, state and national level seminars. The students of both UG and PG are regularly encouraged for active involvement in paper presentations, group-discussions etc.
- **Laboratories-** The Departments of Psychology & Home Science have well equipped labs. The institution plans to construct a lab for Spoken English.

(B) Extra-curricular activities

Sports is an integral part of any academic institution to ensure the proper physical development of students. Since the inception of the college, students have participated in different types of games and have touched different levels of success as sportspersons.


SARJANA - the academic and cultural forum

Personality development programmes are organized by the college which involves various activities like public speaking and communication development etc. Besides this, the college faculty keeps on enriching the students in the art of communicative skills.

The Women Studies Cell, *Udaan*, is one more effective platform for students to present and enhance their communicative skills. Health and Hygiene

The college arranges pure and healthy drinking water facility for the students. Clean toilets are available for the students. Dustbins are provided to throw garbage. In addition to above mentioned activities, our college has a very special concern for the health and hygiene of the college students, staff and other members. There is a first aid room for the treatment of the sick. Through NSS, some medical experts are invited to address the students about how to keep themselves healthy and fit. A part-time Doctor is engaged who attends to the medical needs of the students, thrice a week. There is a proposal to get a ramp and specially designed toilets constructed for differently-abled students.

Our institution plans and ensures that the available infrastructure is in line with its academic growth and is optimally utilized. The college has classes with projector, computer, object camera and laptop to make teaching more effective. Apart from this, facilities like Wi-Fi, Internet, computer lab and rich library is developed in the institution to encourage and assist students in research activities. The institution encourages students to participate in all activities. Students are exposed to ICT, research methodology, basic computer, statistical analysis of data and skill development through soft skill classes & remedial coaching.

The college constitutes different committees for monitoring the optimum utilization of infrastructure facilities and take stock of the lacuna/lapses discerned for proper upkeep of the infrastructural facilities.

The college has a big hall where cultural activities are conducted. It organizes various competitions under the banner of *Sarjana* like debate, elocution, poetry recitation, essay competition, quizzes etc. in the indoor hall while dance, theatre activities, vocal music competitions, mehendi and rangoli are organized on the stage beside the canteen. Thus, despite having limited physical infrastructure the college strives to make optimum utilization of these resources. Sports, cultural and academic activities are planned in such a manner as to put to optimum usage of the available playgrounds, halls, etc.

4.1.4 How does the institution ensure that the infrastructural facilities meet the requirements of students with physical disabilities?

The college provides all assistance to students and teachers with physical disabilities. As far as possible, efforts are made to accommodate such students on the ground floor classes with front seating arrangements. The college library is on the ground floor for easy access. Construction of ramps and specially designed toilets for such students is under consideration.

4.1.5 Give details of the residential facility and various provisions available within them.

Vasant Balika Vihar, a residential facility for approximately 100 students for UG and PG is run by Besant Education Fellowship (BEF), a part of The Theosophical Society.

- It has a mess, wi-fi, audio visual facility for recreation of the students, photostat machine and daily newspapers are made available to the students for the enhancement of their knowledge.
- Students are given free medical facility in the Annie Besant Charitable Dispensary.
- The hostel has an assembly ground *Lata Mandap* for daily prayers, social get-together and recreational activities.
- To ensure a constant supply of safe drinking water, aquaguard and a water cooler is installed in the hostel mess.
- To ensure unobstructed supply of electricity, a solar panel, a generator and an inverter have been installed.
- The hostel provides laundry facility to students on payment basis.
- 24 hours security guard is appointed for the safety of students in the hostel and to restrict the movement of unwanted elements.
- There is one vendor of fruits and other eatables within the campus.

4.1.6 What are the provisions made available to students and staff in terms of health care on the campus and off the campus?

The college has a formal MoU with GV Meditech and Galaxy hospital, to cater to the health needs of major stakeholders (staff and students). This is a cashless facility for stakeholders provided at CGHS rate. It also provides first-aid facilities to college students, teaching and non-teaching staff. In each academic session, medicines and accessories necessary for first aid are purchased. A part-time lady doctor is engaged to provide medical consultancy to students and staff members. The doctor is provided room and necessary equipments with one bed for sick students. The critical cases are immediately taken to Rama Krishna Mission Hospital being the nearest hospital and to Marwari Hospital, Godowlia. Students also consult the Besant Charitable Dispensary.

- The college makes optimum utilization of the limited space. For the proper functioning of special units like IQAC, Grievance Redressal Unit, Counselling and Career Guidance, rooms are provided. The Women’s Cell of the college '*Udaan*', functions from a room specially allotted to it and continuously organizes a number of programmes under its banner.
- The college has engaged a lady doctor on honorarium basis to provide medical consultancy to students and staff and has allotted a room to the medical practitioner.
- The college has a newly constructed canteen equipped with aquaguard, refrigerator, water cooler and safe and hygienic cooking range.
- To ensure the supply of safe drinking water for students and staff, each of the three floors of the academic block is furnished with aquaguard and water cooler. The staff room is equipped with an RO.
- There is enough open space and a stage where sports and recreational events are held on a regular basis.

The college has clearly marked spaces for the common facilities available on the campus. These facilities include IQAC (Internal Quality Assurance Cell), Grievance Redressal unit, Women's Cell, Counselling and Career Guidance cell, Placement Unit, Health Centre, Canteen, recreational spaces for staff and students, safe drinking water facility, and provision of auditorium etc. The details of such facilities are here as under:

The library has an Advisory Committee which consists of the Principal, Librarian, IQAC Coordinator and 4 faculty members, and two student representatives.

Regular meetings of the Committee are held where committee members provide valuable inputs for the better functioning of the library. On the advice of the committee members, new and relevant journals and books are procured with the funds made available by the UGC.

- Full automation work has been almost completed so as to make library more user-friendly.
- Xerox facility for students and staff is available in the library on payment basis.
- Open access to stack for PG students and research scholars is provided.
- A reading room with reference books, encyclopaedia, magazines, journals, periodicals, newspapers is open for both students and staff members.
- The reading room is also equipped with 4 computers with internet facility.



The college has a partially computerized library.

The seminar hall is equipped with an LCD projector and screen.

4.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure, facilities and equipment of the college?

The Principal, on the basis of the prospective development plan, proposes the infrastructural augmentation needs to the concerned authorities. The UGC sanctions funds based on the requirements, student strength, and the nature of the academic programs offered by the institution. The college development fund is utilized for maintenance and minor repairs of furniture and equipments. An effective monitoring system, through various committees, ensures the optimal utilization of budget allocated. We have a building and maintenance committee for the entire campus headed by the Principal with teachers and some office staff as members.

4.4.3 How and with what frequency does the institute take up calibration and other precision measures for the equipment/instruments?

Annual maintenance and repair of the infrastructure is taken care of by the college in a systematic manner. Day to day maintenance is carried out by the staff appointed for cleaning and maintenance of the building. The computers

and electronic devices are maintained and repaired through the funds available in the institution. The college has one efficient technical assistant who carries out the maintenance and calibration of computers and laptops in the college.

Services of an electrician, carpenter and plumber are available as per requirement. Maintenance of generators are done by the service provider. Aquaguards and one multi-functional printer are under annual maintenance contracts.

There is no major problem of voltage fluctuation in the college campus. However equipments like AC, refrigerator, photocopier machines and computers have voltage stabilizers or UPS installed along with them. For constant water supply, two submersible pumps of 1.5 & 1 hp are installed.

5.1.4 What are the specific support services/facilities available for

- ✓ **Students from SC/ST, OBC and economically weaker sections**
 - Nominal fee is charged from economically weak students.
 - Only refundable fee is charged from SC/ST students.
 - Government scholarships are provided to SC/ST and OBC students.

- Tutorial classes are arranged from time to time for SC/ST students who lag behind the classes in academic performance.
- ✓ **Students with physical disabilities**
 - Few students are of this category. As far as possible, the college tries to arrange the classes of students with physical disability on the ground floor so that they can be spared from physical inconvenience. Construction of ramps and specially designed toilets for such students is under consideration.
- ✓ **Overseas students**
 - None
- ✓ **Students to participate in various competitions/National and International**
 - The college has a proper system for displaying and circulating information of various district, state and national level competitions to make the students aware of these events in time.
 - Students are encouraged to participate in such events. Also, faculty members provide proper guidance for the preparation of such competitions.
 - Transportation facilities are provided to students as far as possible.
 - Faculty members help the participants to compensate for loss of classes by giving extra time, attendance and study material.
- ✓ **Medical assistance to students: health centre, health insurance etc.**
 - The college has a formal MoU with GV Meditech & Galaxy hospital and a tie up with Ram Krishna Mission hospital, Luxa to cater to the health needs of major stakeholders (staff and students). This is a cashless facility for stakeholders provided at CGHS rate.
 - First aid facilities are available
 - A doctor is available for medical consultation thrice a week. In cases of emergency, students are taken to the nearby Ramakrishna Mission Hospital, Marwari Hospital and Besant Charitable Dispensary.
- ✓ **Organizing coaching classes for competitive exams**
 - Although formal coaching classes are not run in the college, faculty members provide guidance and study material to students appearing in various competitive exams.
 - Books, magazines and study material relevant to competitive exams are available in the college library.
 - Students are allowed to attend coaching classes held at the affiliating university, BHU, for competitive exams.
- ✓ **Skill development (Spoken English, computer literacy etc.)**
 - A variety of skill development programmes are run by the college for enhancing the students' personality, knowledge and careers.
 - Besides curriculum teaching, skill development of the students also forms an integral part of our college academics.
 - Diploma and certificate courses are offered in Spoken English for both undergraduate and post-graduate students. To enhance the communication skill in English, audio-visual aids such as audio recorders and DVDs are used to improve pronunciation and language structure.

- Efforts are also on, by the college, to teach Spoken Sanskrit to the students. Workshops are arranged every fortnight for developing awareness towards the richness and relevance of this gradually diminishing language, a great pride of our Indian culture.
 - A fashion designing course is also conducted for students to empower them and to inculcate in them entrepreneurship to begin their own private boutiques/handicraft units for commercial purposes.
 - Personality grooming of students encompassing communication skill, stress-management, and career orientations, etc is provided through lectures, internships and workshops organized by the college from time to time.
 - Music courses (vocal and instrumental) are made available to non-music students to develop their aesthetic sensibilities as well as to provide eligibility for participation in competitions.
 - Students also have an opportunity to learn the ancient Indian art of Yoga by expert trainers for keeping mind and body fit.
 - Computer literacy is also promoted with the provision of a well-equipped computer laboratory facility, run by trained personnel.
- ✓ **Support for “slow learners”**
- Remedial classes are conducted for weak students. Extra time is allotted to them by the faculty members in their free periods.
 - Slow learners are identified through regular classroom discussions following which they are given relevant feedback and also useful counseling for improved performance.
 - Interactive sessions and ‘catch up’ classes are also held to supplement this effort.
- ✓ **Exposures of students to other institutions of higher learning/ corporate/ business house etc.**
- Sincere efforts are made by the faculty of different departments of the college to enhance and supplement students’ syllabus-based academic knowledge through excursions and study tours. These are conducted periodically by students and teachers visiting industrial organizations, manufacturing units, etc.
 - The University faculty and experts from the industrial organizations are also invited for guest lectures/workshops/group discussions at the college premises for sharing their valuable knowledge and experience in different fields.
 - Additionally, students are encouraged to participate actively in various seminars, workshops and competitions organized by other academic institutions.



- In order to meet the challenges of stiff competitions and economic pressures generated by today's dynamic organizations, students are encouraged to develop and hone their entrepreneurial skills in diverse fields such as fashion- designing, food preservation, textiles, dress-making, fabric-painting, handicrafts, language translations and diagnostic testing in hospitals and related institutions.
- Frequent visits by students to different organizations, invited guest lectures, interactive sessions with experts, participation with NGOs are some of the ways to empower students to envisage and generate self-employment ensuring economic security and independence.
- Inspired and motivated by these efforts, some of our students are successfully engaged in running their own boutiques and providing personal grooming services, diagnostic testing services, aiding differently-abled children, running NGOs etc.

5.1.6 Enumerate the policies and strategies of the institution which promote participation of students in extracurricular and co-curricular activities such as sports, games, quiz competitions, debate and discussions, cultural activities, etc.

- The college endeavors to promote physical and mental faculties of students, through various committees consisting both of faculty and students in order to promote the all-round development of students. These committees encourage students' participation in diverse extracurricular as well as co-curricular activities such as sports and cultural competitions.
- The sports committee supervises students' participation in sports such as badminton, kabaddi, kho-kho and volley-ball. Funding for sports kits and awarding of prizes, certificates and mementos is also provided by the college. Expert raining and guidance by professionals and coaches is provided to enhance students' sports performance.
- Additionally, to encourage students' participation in sports, academic support is made available by the faculty of various subjects, such as granting attendance, arranging classroom tests (important part of internal evaluation) according to sports events and taking extra classes to compensate for missed regular lectures.
- Inter-college sports competitions are organized in the college premises. Students actively participate in various sports competitions organized at the university level. Laurels have also been won. Some students have also honoured the college by participating in NCC camps at the University level, undergoing tough training.
- Co-curricular activities like quizzes, debates, music and dance, painting, mehndi, poster and slogan writing are also encouraged in the college by the cultural committee to develop aesthetic senses as well as to foster the competitive spirit in the students. Relevant funds are allocated according to the need.



5.1.7 Enumerating on the support and guidance provided to the students in preparing for the competitive exams, give details on the number of students appeared and qualified in various competitive exams such as UGC-CSIR-NET, UGC-NET, SLET, ATE/ CAT/ GRE/ TOFEL/ GMAT/ Central / State services, Defense, Civil Services, etc.

- Informal guidance is provided to the students to assist them in preparing for such competitive examinations. Approximately, fifty percent students appear for UGC /CSIR-NET and about half of them qualify it. Some students appear for Civil Services, CAT and banking exams.

- The college library is well-equipped with newspapers and competitive magazines to facilitate relevant learning. Computer and internet facilities also exist.
- Students who are preparing for various competitive examinations are given extra assistance for their curriculum if they miss a few regular classes.
- It is difficult to keep track of all students' further academic pursuits after they leave college, yet some information is made available through college alumni.

5.1.8 What type of counselling services are made available to the students (academic, personal, career, psycho-social etc.)

- Counseling has a significant role in students' proper adjustment to academic life. Considering its importance, the college has a separate guidance and counseling cell, which provides round-the-year counseling services to students.
- The process of counseling starts at the time of admission itself. Teachers assist newly admitted students in selecting their major and minor papers, explaining the prospect and employability of each subject.
- Thereafter, career counseling is made available to students in the college premises in collaboration with the placement cell of the college. There is a separate corner for displaying educative and informative print materials such as job watch and job alerts from various newspapers and magazines.
- Special lectures and interactive sessions are regularly organized to update students regarding the eligibility of both conventional and unconventional career opportunities.
- Personal/family problems of students are also taken care of by the cell. Name and availability of the members of the cell is displayed on the notice board. Students, who want, can discuss their problems personally with the teachers and get full support and guidance for that matter. Many times, guardians are also called for meetings. The counsellor helps them understand the perspective of their children and reconcile with them. A students' mentoring programme is planned for the session 2016-17 as a part of *Know Your Student Programme (KYS)*.
- Thus, the college offers a multi-pronged approach towards students' academic, career and personal problems.

5.1.9 Does the institution have a structured mechanism for career guidance and placement of its students? If 'yes', details on the services provided to help students identify job opportunities and prepare themselves for interview and the percentage of students selected during campus interviews by different employers (list the employers and the programmes).

The college has a Guidance and Counselling Cell and a Placement Cell consisting of a few faculty members and student representatives. Some significant activities of Guidance and Counselling Cell of the College are depicted in the table below:-

VKM is a college with Social Sciences and Arts streams. It offers post-graduation in 5 subjects only. As such, placement services are limited to providing information and assisting students to acquire required skills. However, some students have been placed by companies like Star T.V. Group, Nestle etc. Some students have attended internship programmes offered by institutes / industries in Varanasi/ Allahabad.

The college is planning to expand its placement services. Dialogues with the placement cell of BHU are going on to accommodate college students in their data base. Soon, the college will be able to offer more campus placement to students.

- A student grievance redressal cell consisting of 5 senior faculty members from different departments and one student representative is in the college to address any grievance reported by the students. Few grievances have been reported so far, yet any occurring sporadically at either the academic, personal or financial level, are satisfactorily redressed at the classroom teacher level, and if unresolved, then further, at the redressal committee level, through patient hearing and active participation of all parties concerned.
- The consequence is a cordial, supportive and commitment infused work-culture existing throughout the college, where all levels of employees and students peacefully co-exist and strive consistently and happily towards progress and achievement of academic goals.


5.1.11 What are the institutional provisions for resolving issues pertaining to sexual harassment?

Within the college premises, the students are free from any kind of sexual harassment, this being an institution for female candidates only. But, for any such potential threats outside the college premises, in today's risk-fraught society, provision is made by the college to instill such awareness in the students, through invited lectures and interactive sessions with field workers and NGO personnel under the banner of *Udaan*, the Womens' Study Cell of the college. The college has a formal linkage with one such NGO – *Social Action and Research Centre (SARC)*.

Additionally, police helpline numbers are also displayed on notice board for use in such emergencies. Students are discouraged from using provocative attire. In certain programmes like NSS, they are also given demonstration by martial arts professionals regarding self-defense techniques. *Power Angel* from amongst the students is appointed who works as a link between the students and police.

5.1.12 Is there any anti-ragging committee? How many instances (if any) have been reported during the last four years and what action has been taken on these?

Anti-Ragging Committee



- To contain the malaise of ragging infesting the modern institution of higher learning, our college formed an *Anti-ragging sub-committee*, consisting of senior faculty as well as freshers from both undergraduate and post-graduate classes. Besides the Principal's orientation address to the new comers, including stern warning against ragging (a cognizable offence), this committee takes concrete, preventive and remedial steps.
- Awareness efforts are made through strategically placed anti-ragging posters in the college premises, and periodic warning is issued by teachers in the classrooms.
- At the beginning of each session, it is mandatory for students and their parents to submit an anti-ragging undertaking.
- The college also has *Anti-ragging squad* which works in co-ordination with the anti-ragging squad of BHU.
- No offences have been reported till date.

5.1.13 Enumerate the welfare schemes made available to students by the institution.

- **Scholarships & Freeships:**
A variety of scholarships are awarded to needy students on the basis of their economic status. Such information is displayed on the students' notice board from time to time specifying the details and procedure of applying for scholarships. Many students have benefited from these schemes.
- **Health services/Medical assistance to students:**
The college has a formal MoU with GV Meditech & Galaxy hospital to cater to the health needs of major stakeholders(staff and students). This is a cashless facility for stakeholders provided at CGHS rate. Services of a part-time lady doctor are available thrice a week. The college also has a tie-up with a well-known nearby hospital, Ramakrishna Mission. It provides funds for medical emergency when required. Any sudden incidence of ill-health of a student is immediately brought to the notice of the class teacher and Principal and parents are duly informed. First-aid is provided in the college itself.
- **Subsidized Canteen:**
The college has a well-equipped canteen with food items and beverages available at reasonable prices. There exists a college canteen committee

to supervise the proper functioning of the canteen. It keeps an eye on the quality and rates of the snacks, meals and beverages served, in addition to obtaining feedback from the teachers and students regarding taste, hygiene, nutrition and availability of food items. A change is instituted when/if required.



- **Hostel Facilities:**

Vasant Balika Vihar is the residential facility for UG and PG students and is run by Besant Education Fellowship, a part of, The Theosophical Society. All facilities are provided under the vigil of the resident superintendent.

- The hostel has a mess, audio-visual facility for the recreation of students, Photostat machine, wi-fi as well as the provision of daily newspaper for the students for the enhancement of their knowledge.
- It has an assembly ground '*Lata Mandap*' for daily prayers, social get-together and recreational activities.
- To ensure constant supply of safe drinking water, aquaguard and water coolers are installed in the hostel mess.
- The hostel has an inverter and generator to ensure unobstructed supply of electricity to the rooms.
- A panel for solar power has recently been installed.
- The hostel provides laundry facility to students on payment basis.
- 24 hours security guard is appointed for the safety of students and to restrict the movement of unwanted elements.
- There is one vendor of fruits and other eatables within the campus.

5.1.14 Does the institution have a registered Alumni Association? If ‘yes’, what are its activities and major contribution for institutional, academic and infrastructure development?

- There is a recognized Alumni Association in our college. All out-going students are encouraged to become permanent members of the college Alumni Association by filling out the proforma provided at nominal fee. A database has been developed of life members and details regarding their education, careers, mobile numbers, email-id, etc. are maintained. Many ex-students are gainfully employed in different schools and colleges, banks, government services, educational institutions, private companies etc.
- Every year, an alumni meet '*Avartana*' is held in the college premises, where all young and old members interact enthusiastically, sharing valuable experiences from the past and present to enlighten the future generation. Eminent alumni are honoured in annual alumni meets. A number of scholarships for students have been given for the past several years, started by or in the name of alumni or retired teachers of the college. Details have been mentioned in 5.1.2
- This year, the alumni meet '*Avartana*' was called *Atit Gaurav Alankaran* and was held on 29.03.2016. Lt. General S.K. Sinha (former Governor of J&K) was the Chief Guest. The function was held in memory of Lt. General Sinha's mother, Smt. Radha Sinha, an alumna of VKM. He shed light on the role of Dr. Annie Besant in Ireland's struggle for freedom and also recalled how the college has been able to establish itself as one of the leading educational institutions in the field of women education. He donated his books *A Soldier Recalls* and *Guarding Indian Territory* to the college library.

Guest of Honour was Smt. Premini Sinha, wife of General Sinha and an alumna of the college. She reminisced about her days in the college and stressed that women education is essential for the development of any society. Prof. Sushila Singh, Manager and alumna of the college, talked about Dr. Annie Besant's vision regarding women education and how the college succeeds in fulfilling that vision by providing a value based education.





5.2.3 How does the institution facilitate student progression to higher level of education and/or towards employment?

- To assist students in the progression to a higher level of education and career, the college has undertaken various steps, sincerely co-ordinated and carried out by the faculty members.
- The Guidance, Counseling and Placement cells provide relevant information to students via different routes, such as organizing various workshops and seminars. Experts from different fields are also invited to deliver lectures and share personal experiences with students. Such interactive sessions have proved very fruitful in clarifying many fundamental issues.
- Programmes for enhancing personality development, such as public-speaking, stress management and communication skills have been immensely liked by the beneficiary students.
- Visual aids such as notice-board, displays of newspaper advertisements of job-opportunities and premiere colleges, are also used. Please refer to 5.1.9 for significant activities of Guidance and Counselling Cell and Placement Cell of the college.

5.2.4 Enumerate the special support provided to students who are at risk of failure and drop out?

- There are always a few students who are at a risk of failure and drop out, requiring immediate and individual attention. To enable them to overcome such academic hurdles, and to ensure success, subject teachers who are most adept at identifying weak students, provide extra coaching, guidance and study material to them.
- Remedial classes have also proved very useful.
- For drop- out cases, every effort is made to single out the causative factors, leading to quick redressal through personal counseling of both the parents and the students. In case of financial difficulties, the college provides aid through fees concession/fees charged on installment basis.
- Faculty members, almost every year, provide financial help to one to two students at the personal level, so that they can deposit fees and take admission.

5.3 Students Participation and Activities

5.3.1 List the range of sports, games, cultural and other extracurricular activities available to students. Provide details of participation and program calendar.

- A wide range of extracurricular activities, sports, games and cultural activities are undertaken by the college. Maximum students' participation is encouraged to ensure their all-round personality development.
- A major extracurricular event of our college is the NSS programme, consisting of five units, comprising 500 students participating in one-day and seven-day NSS camps organized every year. The major focus is twofold : (1) to make the youth aware of the various social problems existing in our society, such as poverty, illiteracy, domestic violence, backwardness, malnutrition, health problems, etc. (2) to transform the students into instruments of change, enlightening and redressing lives of slum dwellers for a better tomorrow.
- Additionally, invited guest lectures are organized for intellectual awareness on topics of pollution, environmental and legal rights of various sections, women empowerment, etc. Competitive programmes involving activities such as posters and slogan writing on social issues, creative art work as mehendi and rangoli also form an integral part of the NSS training. Students are also provided martial art training and yoga training.

Preparing future sportspersons is another goal of our college. Sports and games are an integral part of everyday curriculum. The college organizes a number of sports activities throughout the year. The annual sports day, holding sports such as kho-kho, kabbaddi, badminton and volley ball is a major event of the college. The two-day event attracts an enormous gathering encompassing faculty and students of all departments, watching, applauding and participating. Medals, trophies and certificates are awarded to winners and participants. Details are listed below:

5.3.3 How does the college seek and use data and feedback from its graduates and employers, to improve the performance and quality of the institutional provisions?

The college has a well-defined mechanism of taking detailed feedback from its final year students (both B.A. & M.A.) about the quality of teaching and other facilities provided by the college such as library, computer lab.

Students are asked to fill a questionnaire especially designed to gather information objectively which is then coded and tabulated by the feedback committee. The evaluation and suggestions offered by students are seriously considered by the college and communicated to the relevant stakeholders by the Principal. This serves as the basis for improvement in various facilities of the college.

Besides this, the external sources of feedback are the external examiners visiting college for practical examination. Faculty members personally interact with them to know their perception about the performance of students and academic atmosphere of the college. Similarly visitors to the exhibitions organized by various departments (Home Science and Painting) and employers visiting the college for campus placement are also potential sources of valuable feedback.

The day- to - day management of the college is vested with the management committee, Principal and IQAC of the college. The Management Committee, after deliberations in its meetings, directs the Principal to implement its quality policy and plans effectively. Our college has an efficient co-ordination and internal management system under the able leadership of the Principal.

6.1.4 What are the procedures adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time?

The curricular and co-curricular programmes of the college are effectively carried out by teams of faculty members constituted for that specific purpose. At the beginning of each academic year, a general staff meeting is convened by the Principal in which convenors of various committees are nominated. The self-appraisal report of the faculty, feedback from stakeholders and interaction with the Heads of Departments helps the Principal to identify the strengths and challenges of each faculty members. Members of various committees are nominated in consultation with the respective convenors on the basis of their potentialities. Every faculty member who is a permanent employee is a member / convener in minimum of one committee. Though new committees are constituted every year, one/two members of the previous committee are retained so as to ensure continuity in its functioning. The committee prepares action plans and discusses with the Principal for final approval. At the end of the academic year, the Heads of Departments and convenors of the committees submit the annual reports of the activities to the concerned committee. Feedback is collected regularly for evaluating the performance of every teacher, department and the college as a whole, from the students. In the light of the above, policies are formulated for the upcoming year.

6.1.5 Give details of the academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top management.

The management of the college is in constant touch with the Principal of the college and has a cordial rapport with her. Through open discussions with the principal and time to time interaction with the faculty, the top management enthuses dynamism among the faculty and creates an environment conducive for the academic growth.

Various other efforts are also made to facilitate the faculty members by:

- Requisitioning and purchasing books according to the needs of the concerned department.

The Principal always encourages and is supportive of the involvement of the staff in the improvement of effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional process. The staff members are given freedom to involve themselves in various activities related to the development of the college.

The most important quality of leadership management is empowerment. Successful leaders enhance their leadership qualities by empowering others to lead by involving others in decision making. Each successive Principal has led to empower and create leaders at every level of the organisation.

Total decentralization of the administrative system for promoting co-operation, innovations and empowerment of the faculty is practised. Various committees are formed comprising of staff members, such as discipline, time table, magazine, cultural, sports, placement etc. In each committee, the convenor / senior staff holds meetings to plan out the committee's activities and schedules.

Various types of leadership positions are occupied by the students such as class representatives, event organisers and members of different committees. They are motivated, guided and appreciated from time to time.

Committees comprising teachers from different departments, coordinate and conduct various activities and events in the college.


This system of decentralisation and accountability paves way for sharing of duties and responsibilities, binding all stakeholders in a positive way and building good human relations.

The Management Committee is the highest decision-making authority along with the Principal. There are several sub-committees to run the administration, formed by the Principal. The administration has opted for a decentralized mode for smooth and effective functioning. The sub-committees formed in the beginning of each session, work with their in-charges, regular meetings are held, programmes for the session decided, workload is distributed and the programmes are successfully implemented. The committees maintain proper records. All the committees work in consultation with the Principal and with other committees.

The college Management Committee comprises of the President, Manager, Principal, BHU nominee, members from BEF & TS and two teachers' representatives.

Teachers actively participate in taking decisions related to curriculum, teaching-learning and assessment processes. Senior faculty members have representation in all committees operating in the college along with new faculty members.

Tutorials/ remedial classes see to the personal development and participation of each and every student.

Any holding of any event/ activity beyond the fixed schedule, is discussed at the above levels and the decisions are promptly informed through notices and other communication channels.

The college understands the importance of a strong relationship among all stake- holders. The institution promotes grapevine communication channels for perfect interaction of all stakeholders.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

The day-to-day management of the college is vested with the Principal, College Committee and IQAC. The Management Committee takes policy decisions in the matter of finance, development, expansion etc. after deliberations in its meetings, and directs the Principal to implement its quality policies and plans effectively.

The Principal is the key authority to ensure implementation of its policy and plans. She is the link with the management committee, UGC, BHU and different stakeholders of the college.

The Principal provides overall leadership and direction to the college and presides over its academic and administrative departments. She is the key representative of the college to the entire academic community and to external agencies and fosters the public image of the college, a centre of higher learning. She also maintains a close relationship with the affiliating university and the government. She is the academic, administrative and financial head of the college. The Principal is assisted by the college committee in her day-to-day decisions. The college committee ensures that the formulated plans are executed and the goals of the college are achieved. The department heads supervise instruction in individual disciplines and in this capacity guide the teaching staff in ways that lead to the fulfilment of the set goals of the college. Various campus activities are carried out and monitored by the committees constituted for specific purposes and are in turn supervised by the IQAC. IQAC, the institutional agency for quality assurance and enhancement is in operation since 2007 and takes care of the quality sustenance tasks of all aspects in the functioning of the college.


Faculty members are involved in the design and implementation of quality policies. Faculty members, administrative staff and student representatives are members of various committees in the college through which most of the plans are implemented.

The Administrative Officer is the head of the administrative wing and she reports directly to the Principal. She is also entrusted with the responsibility of smoothening the college's path in the achievement of its goals with the help of the ministerial staff. The Librarian of the college, with the assistance of library

assistants, looks after the most important learning resource of the college, the library, and disseminates its intellectual stock effectively.

Students' representatives elected by the students at the beginning of each session, are the important links between administration and students. They communicate the students' concerns to the teachers or specific committees, organize various student- centric activities under the guidance of teachers and ensure the participation of the whole student community in the campus activities.

6.2.4 Give a broad description of the quality improvement strategies of the institution for each of the following - Teaching & Learning, Research & development, Community engagement, Human resource management, industry interaction.

Teaching & Learning

The college has framed various strategies which enhance the quality sustenance activities. The procedure adopted for admissions to various programmes offered by the college is based on AIUET conducted by the affiliating University, BHU. The rules and regulations set by BHU are strictly followed for the students' admissions.

Apart from the lecture method of teaching, group discussions, field studies, debates, seminars and remedial classes for weaker students etc. are adopted for proper understanding of the subjects. The college has efficient and committed faculty members. Regular tests and assignments, as well as co-curricular activities are organized for the students. Regular feedback of the same is communicated to the students by the teachers in their respective classes. The use of innovative teaching methods/tools using LCDs, ICT, group discussions, projects etc. contribute to create interest and enthusiasm for learning in students. The Principal also conducts academic audit using feedback from the students. The teachers are given full freedom to enrich their knowledge through seminars and orientation programmes. The college follows the self – appraisal method and student feedback system to evaluate the performance of the faculty. The college encourages the teachers to participate in self-enriching courses whenever different institutions organise them. The teachers are also encouraged and motivated to interact with the neighbouring teaching faculty members for consultation and learning of innovative teaching techniques.

The library staff is well qualified and their services and experiences are used in updating the library for optimum use by the students. The reference section in the library provides the required learning materials in the respective subjects and in general knowledge, both for the staff and students. Journals, both subject-based and general, are another important source for learning and updating knowledge for the students and the teachers. Teachers and postgraduate students are given e-journal facility of the N-LIST. e-journals can be accessed by teachers through INFLIBNET. Library automation has been completed. Software LIBSYS is used for issue and return of books.

The Principal conducts academic audit using feedback from the students. The academic audit by the Principal and discussions during staff meetings create awareness among staff members about their responsibilities. She also interacts with the staff and students informally, on the completion of the syllabus and gets feedback from the students about the teaching and communication skill of their subject teacher. She also receives feedback on teachers from the students through feedback forms which include details regarding commitment to the completion of the syllabus, effectiveness and quality, punctuality and regularity, approachability, use of technology aids, discipline, and regularity in giving tests and assignments, services of library and office.

Research & Development

The faculty is very much aware of the growing importance of the research-based education. The college encourages the teachers for research work. Many teachers of the college are engaged in active research work. Presently the college has one faculty having M.Phil. degree and three are pursuing their doctoral programme. The college promotes and motivates the faculty members to do part-time research work. It encourages teachers to participate and organise seminars, symposia, conferences and workshops and to publish research articles in reputed journals. The teachers are also encouraged to make proposals for major and minor projects and submit it to the UGC or other funding agencies after due deliberation by the internal Project Committee. Five departments offering PG courses conduct PhD programmes also.

The final year undergraduate and postgraduate students of social sciences have to submit a dissertation as part of their curriculum. The UG and PG students are encouraged to undertake community- oriented problems for their project study. The faculty members act as guides to the students in their research work.

Community engagement

The college aims to mould the students into better individuals and guide them to contribute constructively towards the national goal by upholding the

positive values for the betterment of society. The goal of the college is that the students should be intellectually enlightened, emotionally sound and practically efficient. In accordance with the vision of the college, community-oriented programmes are undertaken by forums like **NSS**, **Red Ribbon Club**, **Grain Bank** etc. Such forums organise programmes like blood donation camps, awareness programmes on health, hygiene, cleanliness, adult literacy, gender equality, environmental waste management etc. Students stage street plays, take out rallies in support of social issues, carry out Ganga-ghats cleaning drives etc.

- The NSS co-ordinates various extension activities of the college. Through NSS, the students are encouraged to undertake community-oriented activities like social work, health and hygiene awareness, medical camps, adult education and literacy programmes, blood donation, AIDS awareness, environmental awareness.
- Students and teachers are provided with money and time from the college for extension activities. For example, educational tours are organized by various departments to connect from lab to land.
- The Red Ribbon Club was established :
 - To educate the youth with correct, concise and adequate information and heighten their level of awareness about HIV/AIDS/STI/sexuality and other related issues (thus eliminate myths and misconceptions).
 - To enable the youth, especially female students, to identify and understand the situations of exploitation and abuse.
 - To organize and facilitate voluntary blood donation camps and mobilize the youth for voluntary blood donation.
 - To develop a cadre of Peer Educators among the youth. Four volunteers of the college participated in the five days '**Peer Education Workshop**' organized in the office of NSS, BHU from 10 to 14 April, 2013.
 - The college has 60 volunteers as members of the Red Ribbon Club.

- The grain bank is another means through which students and teachers contribute towards the inclusion of the less privileged class of the society in the mainstream. Keeping in mind the relevance of right to food, the college has taken an initiative to open an account with the **Kashi Anaj Bank**. It was started by **Vishal Bharat Sansthan**, an NGO in Varanasi, and is perhaps the only bank of its kind, where depositors will not get any interest in

monetary form, but they get satisfaction and invocation in return. The bank has been started to help those poor families who find it hard to manage two meals a day. The college deposited about 3 quintals of grain including rice, pulses, wheat, cooking oil etc.

- Students also participate in community activities in coordination with NGOs like **SARC**, **Lok Chetna Samiti**.
- The college also organizes sports activities and encourages the students to participate in them so as to inculcate in them organizational ability and a penchant for team work.
- The college organised the various community-based programmes and competitions under the **Kartavya-bodh Pakhwara** programme of the Prime Minister during the session 2015-16 (12.01.2016 to 26.01.2016):-
 - ❖ Lecture on **Responsibilities of Citizens** on 12.01.2016. Speaker was Dr.Rachana Srivastava (Associate Professor, Department of Political Science, VKM).
 - ❖ Under the **Energy Conservation Programme**, it was decided that all electrical equipments would be switched off for one hour in the college during the fortnight and the same was successfully accomplished.
 - ❖ Under the **Environment Preservation** programme, on 13.01.2016, the entire faculty and staff came to college on cycle/on foot/ by public transport.
 - ❖ A cleanliness drive was undertaken by the students on 14.01.2016. They also sought to spread awareness against the use of polythene.
 - ❖ A grain bank was opened under the name of the Principal, VKM on 16.01.2016. The entire staff and students of the college donated 3 quintals of grain to the bank.
 - ❖ Under the **Skill Development Programme** of the Prime Minister, an orientation programme was organised on 18.01.2016. Speaker Shri Aditya Raj, ALPRAN SOFTWARE, Mahmoorganj, Varanasi, provided information regarding the course. The certificates were provided by the National Skill Development Corp. (NSDC) which would be helpful in attaining jobs in the future.
 - ❖ A blood donation camp was held on 23.01.2016. 20 students and 3 staff members donated blood on the occasion.
 - ❖ Various competitions in speech, slogan, poster, poetry recitation, were held throughout the fortnight.
 - ❖ The closing of the Pakhwara was held on Republic Day. 15 blind students from **Poddar Andh Vidyalaya**, Durgakund, Varanasi were invited. The aim was to spread awareness that the differently-abled had the potential to be actively included in the society. They were in no way inferior to others.

Human resource management

A cordial staff –management relation exists in the college. The college follows a well-defined charter of roles and functions for its personnel and the staff. Only qualified persons are recruited as teaching and non- teaching staff. They are briefed about their roles to bring about coordination and team spirit among them. They are deputed to participate in workshops, training programmes and conferences thereby updating their knowledge. Occasionally, training programmes are conducted within the college. Services of retired teachers on payment basis from the management fund are hired as and when required. The staff is encouraged to upgrade themselves through quality research work and is supported by good infrastructure. Research scholars and part-time lecturers also take classes.

Industry Interaction

Industrial visits and interactions with industrial experts are arranged regularly. Faculty and students are encouraged to participate in workshops and conferences and present research papers. The under-graduate and post-graduate students of Home Science and Psychology work on projects in collaboration with industrial houses. The placement cell of the college arranges placement drives and recruitment with industrial houses. Career guidance sessions by industry experts are arranged periodically.

6.2.5 How does the Head of the institution ensure that adequate information (from feedback and personal contacts etc.) is available for the top management and the stakeholders, to review the activities of the institution?

The Management and the Principal interact with each other regularly and the Principal apprises it of the developments taking place in the college. In the meetings of the Management Committee, the information gathered from different sources is discussed. An annual report on all aspects of the entire working of the college is sent to BEF and BHU. Feedback from all the stakeholders are collected periodically, consolidated, analysed and placed before college committee for future action and improvement.

Availability of information to different stakeholders-

Parents - Informal parent-teacher meetings and parent counselling sessions are held once a semester or as per need to convey the students' progress or any other related issue, like regularity, discipline etc.

Students - Students are kept informed through written circulars, displays on the notice-board and bulletin boards. The information is also sent orally to the class through the subject teacher. Information is also disseminated through the college website, college brochure, bulk messages and annual magazine, *Vasantshree*.

Alumni - Alumni are informed through e-mail, college website, social media, telephonic conversations, annual magazine and also through personal interaction with teaching and non-teaching staff members.

Corporate and Industry - The college interacts with companies and industries through industrial visits, workshops and seminars in which industry experts are invited as guest speakers. Two representatives of Industry are members of the IQAC. The college website is also a means to make information available to industry.

Community - The community is given college-related information through the college website and extension activities.

6.2.6 How does the management encourage and support involvement of the staff in improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional processes?

The Management is always encouraging and supports the involvement of the staff in the improvement of effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional process. Through the Principal, it ensures the participation of the staff members in various activities related to the development of the college in the following ways:

- The participation of the staff is ensured in the planning stage of all teaching-learning and extra- curricular activities by conducting meetings at different levels.
- Informal meetings of the teachers with the head of the department are also conducted to discuss the allocation of topics to be taught, completion of topics, framing of assignments, preparation of departmental time-table, and conducting internal tests.
- Periodic meetings of the head of the departments and committee in-charges with the Principal are conducted to ensure a smooth and efficient running of the college, to prepare the time-table and to discuss various instructions from the University or UGC.
- The staff members participating in execution of the institutional activities are motivated and their good work is always appreciated.
- The Principal conducts meetings of the non-teaching staff members.
- In order to monitor the performance of the teachers, the college collects feedback from the students.
- There are some special committees such as the IQAC, NAAC Steering Committee, College Committee, Maintenance Committee, Building Committee, Admission Committee, Staff Selection Committee, Canteen Committee, Purchase Committee, Examination Committee, Grievance Redressal Cell, Women's Studies Cell, *Udaan*, Student Advisory Committee, Sports Committee etc., which help to contribute a lot in managing the college administration.
- The Management encourages research activities by providing funds for seminars, workshops, conferences and guest lectures.
- The Principal is always available to guide the entire staff for overall development of the college.

6.2.8 Does the affiliating university make a provision for according the status of autonomy to an affiliated institution? If „yes“, what are the efforts made by the institution in obtaining autonomy?

The college follows the academic calendar of the affiliating university-BHU. However, the University provides full autonomy in administrative and financial matters to the affiliated colleges.

6.2.9 How does the Institution ensure that grievances / complaints are promptly attended to and resolved effectively? Is there a mechanism to analyze the nature of grievances for promoting better stakeholder relationship?

The college has a Students Grievance Redressal Committee consisting of senior faculty members and one student representative. It is committed to provide the best facilities and quality education to the students and takes a keen interest in fulfilling the needs of the stakeholders. Students are free to represent their grievances regarding academic matters, financial matters, canteen services, library, accommodation, infrastructure facilities etc. A three-tier mechanism exists in the college to redress the grievances of the students. First, they can approach the subject teacher. Matters that cannot be sorted out at that level are referred to the head of the department. Most of the grievances regarding academic matters are redressed at the departmental level. Grievances that involve discipline and financial matters are forwarded to the Grievance Redressal Cell. Students can also drop their grievances in the suggestion box. The Cell actively interacts with the students to help them solve their grievances. It attends to both registered and unregistered grievances of the students. Necessary action is taken after issues are discussed in the Cell. The same is applicable to other stakeholders.

Thus whatever grievances/ complaints are received orally/ written are promptly resolved.

6.2.10 During the last four years, had there been any instances of court cases filed by and against the institute? Provide details on the issues and decisions of the courts on these?

There had been no court cases filed by and against the college during the last four years.

6.2.11 Does the Institution have a mechanism for analyzing student feedback on Institutional performance? If yes, what was the outcome and response of the institution to such an effort?

The college has a clear set mechanism of obtaining the feedback from the students to improve the performance and quality of the institutional provisions. The academic audit process is conducted in various ways such as feedback from students in a written format and an informal, verbal feedback. The suggestion boxes are kept in front of the reading room. The suggestions are analysed and efforts are made to improve the institutional performance. The outgoing students are required to fill specially designed feedback forms on the performance of the office, library, teachers and canteen. They are also encouraged to make suggestions for improvement in college facilities. A feedback committee collects the information and analyses it and submits its report to the Principal. The student feedback on teachers, office, canteen and library is discussed with concerned departments or committees and necessary action to rectify the issues are taken.

The Principal's discussion with the staff during staff meetings, performance of the students in tests, examinations, extracurricular activities and students' feedback and suggestions on the same help the college towards quality performance and improvement at every step and in every area.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 What are the efforts made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non-teaching staff?

The college has constantly encouraged the faculty to participate in national and international conferences, seminars, symposia, workshops, training programmes etc. They are given duty leave for this purpose. The teaching staff is encouraged to publish research papers in reputed journals, organize seminars, guest lectures for students and faculty members, bring projects to the departments and work on them. The non-teaching staff is also supported to upgrade their skills and multi-tasking abilities. Computer awareness training programmes have also been conducted for them. Lectures on organizational behaviour for teaching and non-teaching staff are conducted from time to time. Yoga sessions are also promoted in order to enhance their concentration.

6.3.2 What are the strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment through training/retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibilities they perform?

Computer training programmes like a training programme on the use of SPSS software was held in the session 2012-13 for staff members. Faculty members are granted duty leave/special study leave for participating in orientation courses, refresher courses, faculty development programme/training

programme/summer and winter schools etc. as a part of retraining to enhance their knowledge.

A well-equipped library of the college with numerous books, journals, e-journals and magazines helps faculty members to access information which motivates them to improve their teaching performance. The library also holds training programmes for its staff to acquaint them with software being used by the library for easy accession of books.

6.3.3 Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

The college follows the “Performance Based Assessment System (PBAS) as per UGC/BHU norms. The University has developed an Academic Performance Indicator (API) system which is based on PBAS system developed by the UGC. The API is divided into three categories-

- (i) Teaching, learning and evaluation related activities.
- (ii) Co-curricular, extension and professional development related activities.
- (iii) Research, publications, awards received, academic contributions etc.

These API scores are presented before the selection committee at the time of promotion under the Career Advancement Scheme (CAS).

Students' feedback is also taken and analysed by the Feedback Committee of the college in each session and faculty members, library and office staff are advised accordingly for better performance.

6.3.4 What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the Management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?

The promotion of all teaching staff and librarian is done under CAS (Career Advancement Scheme) based on PBAS (Performance Based Assessment System) developed by the UGC. When these promotions are confirmed by the Management Committee, then they are communicated to the concerned member.

6.3.5 What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non-teaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years?

The college has various welfare schemes for its teaching and non-teaching staff which are as follows-

- We have a grievance redressal cell in which we settle mutual disputes.
- National Pension System.
- Provision of supernumerary seats in UG/PG courses running in the college for daughters of the employees, given as per BHU rules.
- Medical leave, maternity/paternity leave, child care leave, child education allowance up to 18 years of child.
- LTC is in the pipeline and cash less Medical scheme has been implemented.
- Part-time services of one medical practitioner are available.

- GPF & Group insurance.
 - Canteen and recreation facilities are made available in the college.
- 100% of the eligible staff is beneficiary of these welfare schemes.

6.3.6 What are the measures taken by the Institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

1. In order to attract eminent faculty, an advertisement is placed in a national employment newspaper and other local and national daily newspapers and website of the college.
2. After appointment, the faculties are given attractive salary and allowances as per the UGC/Central government norms.
3. Additional increment for PhD qualified staff.
4. Encouragement to do research work by giving flexible time-table.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

The financial resources of the college are managed in a very effective and efficient manner. There is both manual and computerized accounting system in the college. The following accounts are maintained:-

- Income and expenditure accounts
 - There are two types of payments /expenditures
 - Salary
 - Non-Salary
 - The college receives the following grants from the UGC -
 - Plan Grant - XII five year plan
 - Non-plan Grant - Salary, Non Salary
 - Pension & Retirement Benefit

Each and every transaction is supported by vouchers. All the transactions are made through cheques. Only duly authorized persons, Principal & Manager can operate the bank account. Proper procedure for purchase is adopted. Quotations are called for and prices are compared. The institution has formed a Purchase Committee for this purpose. All the receipts and vouchers are initialled by the Purchase Committee, Principal and Manager.

The annual accounts are audited by a chartered accountant. For efficient use of financial resources, an annual budget is prepared and submitted to the UGC - the main funding agency.

The college is liberal yet follows the strategy of restraint as far as the expenditure is concerned. The regular audit of the budget also exercises check on the expenditure.

6.4.2 What is the institutional mechanism for internal and external audit? When was the last audit done and what are the major audit objections. Provide the details on compliance.

The college has a mechanism for annual external audit through a registered chartered accountant. The government audit was done regularly on annual basis till 2006-07. Since 2008, the college has been receiving grant directly from the UGC, and as such, the State audit has stopped.

- Annual accounts up to the financial year ended on 31st March 2016 and were audited by external auditors.
- There were no significant/major objections raised by the auditors.

6.4.3 What are the major sources of institutional receipts/ funding and how is the deficit managed? Provide audited income and expenditure statement of academic and administrative activities of the previous four years and the reserve fund / corpus available with institution, if any.

Since 2008, the major sources of fund received by the college are :

- **GRANT**
 - a) UGC - 95% - Maintenance grant to meet salary & non –salary expenditure.
 - b) Management contribution - 5%
- **RECEIPTS**
Fee received from students.
- Deficit, if any, is managed by management contribution and receipts and further when the grant from UGC is released, adjustment is made.

The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) at the time of its inception decided to evolve a mechanism and procedure for the following:

- i) Timely, efficient and progressive performance of academic, administrative and financial matters.
- ii) Proper organization of academic and other programmes.
- iii) Documentation of various programmes/activities for quality
- iv) Preparation of Annual Quality Assurance Report.

The committee plans and monitors the internal quality pertaining to the academic, curricular and co-curricular activities of the college. The IQAC conceives, plans and executes growth-oriented programmes and keeps a critical eye over the functioning of all the components of the college to frame or reframe strategies for quality improvement. The institutional policy with regard to quality assurance is enumerated as below:

- Imparting quality and responsible education and orientation for all-round development of the students by implementing university-approved curriculum.
- Continuous up-gradation of facilities and human resources with a commitment to strive for improvement in all aspects of quality management.

- Providing additional inputs to the students which would enhance their employability on the global platform.
- Introducing special programmes to inculcate values and patriotic feeling in the youth.
- Encouraging faculty to submit proposals to the Principal and college committee for workshops, seminars, conferences, and invited talks.
- Developing strategies for further improvement in sports, academic and cultural activities.
- Introducing career-oriented add-on programmes.

The college has a definite mechanism which helps in quality assurance processes. The academic quality of the college is maintained by the teaching and learning processes. The administrative quality is ensured by the functions carried out effectively by the office and various committees formed at the beginning of each session. The Principal conducts regular meetings with various committees, library, teaching and non-teaching staff to ensure proper functioning of academic, co-curricular & extra-curricular activities.

- b. Since its formation, one member from the Management Committee is part of the IQAC. Thus the involvement of the Management Committee in the decision-making process of the IQAC is ensured. As the IQAC and the Management Committee work in co-operation with each other, the decisions taken by the IQAC are usually approved. The following proposals put forward by the IQAC through the Principal in the Management Committee were approved for implementation:-
1. To construct a new building comprising of 10 classrooms, 1 staff room, 1 common room, 1 computer lab, renovation of canteen and stage.
 2. To install necessary equipments in the newly constructed rooms.
- c. The IQAC formed in 2007 had the following external member :

To ensure feedback and get valuable suggestions from the society/industry/other institutions of repute, external members have been included in the IQAC. These members have proved to be an asset to the college. Their vast experience has guided and manoeuvred the IQAC.

- d. The alumni and students constantly support and provide valuable inputs to improve quality in terms of academics, infrastructure etc. They make suggestions regarding improvement in the teaching-learning process, examination system, day-to-day facilities like library services, canteen services etc. They are also informed about the decisions taken and policies made by the IQAC for their welfare through notices, announcements, emails, posts on college website and Facebook page of the college.
- The IQAC, formed in 2013, had one alumna as its member- Mrs. Uma Bhattacharya, retired Civil Servant from Government of India and an active member of the parent body of the college, Theosophical Society. Even before being part of the IQAC formally, Mrs. Uma Bhattacharya was giving valuable inputs regarding the efficient working of the college. The creation of the Annie Besant Spirit Progression programme, programmes for value inculcation in students and crash courses for students to prepare them to face the outside world, have been some of her suggestions. The college is in constant touch with its alumni through its annual alumni meet '*Avartana*'. Many of its alumni hold illustrious positions.

The students are the major stakeholders in this process of teaching-learning and the college ensures their involvement in the curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities. A student representative as member of the IQAC has been selected since 2013.

- At the very beginning of each session, student representatives are elected for both UG and PG courses. These representatives communicate their fellow students' concerns to the concerned teachers or committees. They also organize, with able guidance from faculty members, various student-centric activities like Sarjana, Spandan, Udaan, exhibitions, guest lectures, sports events, NSS programmes etc.
 - Regular attendance of the students and their timely submission of assignments etc. have contributed to the maintenance of the academic quality of the college.
- e. VKM has a strong faculty base. The administration of curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities is maintained by the involvement of the faculty members at every level. At the very beginning of the session, a number of committees are formed for the smooth functioning of the college and organization of various student-centric

activities. The non-teaching staff is also a significant component of these committees. The in-charges of these committees, in consultation with the Principal and members of the IQAC, hold meetings with their committee members, chalk out plans for the session and incorporate the plan of action decided upon by the IQAC at the commencement of the session. For eg.- forums like *NSS* and '*Sarjana*', the academic and cultural forum of the students, hold students' debates on topics related to the Annie Besant Spirit Progression and value inculcation, which are an integral and constant part of the plan of action decided upon by the IQAC.

The faculty is involved not only at the level of execution of plan of action adopted by the IQAC, but all strategies of the IQAC are formulated in consultation with the faculty members and students. The working of the IQAC is of a participatory nature.

6.5.2 Does the institution have an integrated framework for Quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities? If "yes", give details on its operationalisation.

The college has an integrated framework for quality assurance of its academic and administrative activities. The IQAC conducts regular meetings in which various initiatives are discussed before its implementation. These initiatives are usually related to teaching, learning, evaluation and counselling of students to improve their academic performance and overall personality. Students and teachers are encouraged to participate in conferences, seminars, workshops, faculty development programmes, present papers and publish research work in reputed journals and remain updated in their subjects. Such activities are recorded and analyzed as part of quality assurance. Quality circles are conducted to improve the academic performance and co-curricular activities of the departments.

6.5.3 Does the institution provide training to its staff for effective implementation of the Quality assurance procedures? If "yes", give details enumerating its impact.

The college ensures that the decisions based on the findings of the IQAC are fully adhered to. The academic as well as the administrative working is further smoothed from time to time through training sessions organized by the college for its teaching as well as non-teaching staff. Small workshops in the form of interactive sessions, have helped the staff work in a better and more promising way.

Details of training programmes:-

1. A training programme on *Statistics and Methods of Research* by Prof. T. B. Singh (IMS, BHU) was organized during 2013-14 for students and teachers of the department of Home Science.
2. A training programme was organized for teachers and students to make them acquainted with the use of *SPSS software* (Version 19) and *Statistica* (Version 19). The resource person was from Sharda Software Enterprise, Allahabad.
3. Two training programmes on organizational behaviour were organized in sessions 2012-13 and 2015-16.
4. A training programme in Computer and a Capacity Building Workshop were organized for non-teaching staff in 2012-13 and 2015-16

respectively.

5. On 13.7.2016, a training programme was organized by the library to acquaint the teachers with the new software *Webopac*, for easy accession of the books.

Such training sessions and programmes enrich the teaching-learning and research processes. Lectures and short training programmes are organized for the benefit of the office staff too.

These programmes have undoubtedly helped in the effective implementation of the quality assurance procedure. Their impact is as follows:

1. Use of modern teaching aids and tools.
2. Extensive use of ICT tools in the teaching-learning process.
3. Awareness about latest developments in the higher education policy and guidelines.
4. Healthy communication amongst all stakeholders.

6.5.4 Does the institution undertake academic Audit or other external review of the academic provision? If "yes", how are the outcomes used to improve the institutional activities?

The college is affiliated to BHU. The University (BHU) is the academic regulator of VKM. The college follows the syllabus, admission and examination processes as formulated by BHU. At the end of each session, the college sends a report of its curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities to the university which is incorporated in its annual report.

The University, from time to time, sends teams of experts to conduct academic audit. Whenever new courses are introduced, the university sends a team of experts to analyse the potential of the college. One such team visited the college in 2011 to observe the running of PG courses in 5 subjects introduced in 2009 and Ph.D. in the same subjects. The committee makes constructive observations which the college tries to incorporate in its functioning.

The college sends its annual report to the Besant Education Fellowship (BEF), at the end of each session. Members of BEF and the Management Committee of Theosophical Society regularly visit the college and provide useful inputs on how to enrich co-curricular and extra-curricular activities as well as how to propagate the Annie Besant spirit and values among students in accordance with our mission of combining modernity with tradition, education as service and freedom with responsibility.

Besides this, each year, at the end of the academic session, the Principal holds a review meeting with the teaching and non-teaching staff. A fresh plan of action is adopted after deliberation upon the action taken /significant activities done during the session. New committees are formed or old ones re-organized for the implementation of these plans.

Constant and healthy interaction amongst teachers and students also provides an insight into the working of different departments and helps them reform strategies if and when required. Session- end feedback from students is also an effective measure to identify the strengths and weaknesses of various components of the college.

6.5.5 How are the internal quality assurance mechanism aligned with the requirements of the relevant external quality assurance agencies/regulatory authorities?

The college is affiliated to BHU which is the academic regulator of the college. The college follows the academic calendar decided by the university. UGC acts as an external quality assurance agency by prescribing the requirements of Career Advancement Schemes (CAS).

The IQAC, as per its plan of action, is committed to student-centric, faculty-centric and infrastructure-centric activities. It encourages faculty members to take regular classes, give quality time to students, participate in seminars, make research and seminar proposals, publish research papers and books.

Another external regulatory agency is NAAC. The college has completed the first cycle of accreditation and is now in the second cycle of the same. It has set up a NAAC Steering Committee which frequently engages in brainstorming sessions. Suggestions are recorded. The Steering Committee and IQAC ensure that all necessary steps are taken to maintain and enhance, wherever required, the performance of the college on the various parameters set by NAAC.

6.5.6 What institutional mechanisms are in place to continuously review the teaching-learning process? Give details of its structure, methodologies of operations and outcome.

The annual academic audit helps to have a periodic review of the academic, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities of each sub-unit of the college. Continuous review of the teaching-learning process is done in the following manner:

Admission Committee: Assesses the performance of the students seeking admission in the college in their qualifying examinations and guides them for admission in the different subjects offered in the college.

However, with the admission process going totally online, limited role is played by the admission committee in guiding students in the choice of their subjects.

Time-table committee: The college frames the over-all time-table for odd and even semesters.

Continuous evaluation: The college has a clearly defined, set mechanism to continuously monitor the learning outcome. It conducts internal assessment tests during each semester for the students through which the learning process of the students is assessed. As part of continuous evaluation, student attendance is compulsorily taken for every lecture. Based on the participation in the class and the marks scored in the tests and assignments, the students' level is judged by the faculty members and appropriate internal evaluation grades/marks are allotted to them. At the end of each internal examination, progress report consisting of test results and attendance status are communicated to the students.

Semester-end examinations are conducted by the affiliating university. Evaluation work is transparent. Marks of both sessionals and semester examinations are entered online and the same are displayed to students duly. Students can see their marks of both internal & external examinations and can understand their strong and weak points.

The entire system of teaching-learning and evaluation is very student-friendly. VKM is the second most preferred college during admission, by the students.

6.5.7 How does the institution communicate its quality assurance policies, mechanism and outcomes to the various internal and external stakeholders?

The college communicates its quality assurance policies, mechanism and outcomes to the various internal stakeholders like parents, students and staff through notices, meetings, etc. Specifically, the college communicates its quality assurance policies to the parents during orientation programmes, admission interviews, parent-teachers meeting, students during orientation programmes and to the staff during staff meetings and other informal interactions.

The quality assurance policies of the college are communicated to the various external stakeholders through press releases, letters, information brochures, prospectus, college magazine *Vasantshree*, *Yug Chetna*, college website, etc.

The Management and Principal interact with each other regularly and the latter appraises the former of the developments taking place in the college.

Feedback from all stakeholders are collected periodically, consolidated and analysed and placed before the college committee for future action and improvement.

Availability of information to various stakeholders-

Parents-- Informal parent-teacher meetings and parent-counselling sessions are held once a semester or as per need to convey the students' progress or any other related issues, like regularity, discipline etc. Oral discussions with the Principal and subject teacher on a one-to-one basis are also held.

Students --Students are kept informed through written circulars, displays on the notice board and bulletin boards. Information is sent orally to the class through the subject teacher. Information is also disseminated through the college website, brochures, prospectus, bulk messages and the annual magazine *Vasantshree* and *Yug Chetna*.

Alumni--The alumni are informed through e-mail, college website, social media, telephonic conversations, annual magazine and also through personal interaction with teaching and non-teaching staff members.

Corporate and Industry--Industrial visits, workshops and seminars in which industry experts are invited as guest speakers are the medium through which the college interacts with companies and industries. Two representatives of industry are members of the IQAC. The college website is also a means to pass information to the industry.

Community--The community is given college-related information through the college website and extension activities.

The college maintenance committee regularly monitors greenery and plantation programmes of the college.

The college is situated in the green surroundings of the Indian Section of The Theosophical Society. It forms the greenest patch within the radius of 1000 metres in the heart of the city. The college campus also contributes its green share in maintaining this environmental grace.

- **ENERGY CONSERVATION**
 - a) Introduction of LED bulbs in the office building.
 - b) Vasant Balika Vihar, the hostel, has one solar panel installed in the courtyard.
 - c) The college plans to install more solar-panels on the roof-tops of college building.
 - d) Our staff is conscious enough in using electricity with minimal wastage.
 - e) The college itself organized distribution of LED bulbs to staff and students in collaboration with Uttar Pradesh Power Corporation Limited (UPPCL).
- **USE OF RENEWABLE ENERGY**
 - a) Proposed solar panels will re-use solar energy in lightening of the campus.
 - b) The proposal of installing solar-water heaters in the hostel building.
- **EFFORTS FOR CARBON NEUTRALITY**
 - a) The bio-degradable waste is regularly buried in the earth. It not only supports carbon-neutrality but also produces excellent manure for plants.
 - b) We encourage students and staff to use eco-friendly means of conveyance.
 - c) The college campus is declared as no polythene zone.

d) The college has designated mobile zones for students both to limit the use of mobiles and also to contain the harmful radiation emanating from mobile sets.

- **PLANTATION**

Our plantation programme is carefully monitored by the college maintenance committee. A trained gardener takes good care of gardening and plantation. Also, the NSS programme conducts regular checking of plant waste and planting of new saplings.



On 6.8.16, VKM organized a plantation drive entitled "Call to Nature". It was an initiative taken by the college to spread awareness about environmental issues among the students. Students and trustees of the college planted trees on this occasion. Students voluntarily adopted the planted saplings and took complete responsibility for their day to day care.

The college campus has been declared a no polythene zone.

- **E-WASTE MANAGEMENT**

a) Non-biodegradable waste including e-waste is weeded out by the college weed-out committee and given to the scrap-dealers who recycle the waste.

7.2. Innovations

7.2.1 Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the college.

INNOVATIONS

1. Sanskrit Matri Mandalam

Sanskrit Matri Mandalam, established in 1991, a non-profitting voluntary organization, is being sustained entirely by VKM. The basic purpose of Sanskrit Matri Mandalam is to promote interest in those students who do not know the rich heritage of this classical language. Even the faculties of the college are deeply inspired to learn the rudiments of Sanskrit as Matri Mandalam promotes practical application of the language along with its academic use. To achieve this end, Matri Mandalam implements a schedule of year long programmes, which includes a spoken Sanskrit session every month entirely organized by the students of this college. This spoken Sanskrit workshop is named as *Vagvardhini Sabha*. The activities of this platform are held every month to promote language skill of students. Other activities of Sanskrit Matri Mandalam are :-

- Lecture series to highlight the legacy of the past.
- Workshop for appreciation of variety of Sanskrit meters.
- Elocution in Sanskrit.
- Recitation of the time honoured Sanskrit verses.
- Cultural programmes.

2. Computerization of Office:

The college has done away with the orthodox system of working in the office. The administrative staff has been given formal training to understand the technicalities pertaining to working with technology. The office is using customized software *Eduware* for the admission process and keeping the details of the students.

3. Automation of Library:

The college has made the library fully automated. The library is using the software LIBSYS. The faculty members can access books through *Webopac*. They have access to N-List through INFLIBNET.

4. Classrooms with interactive boards and use of ICT in the teaching-learning process:

To improvise teaching, the college promotes the practice of modern devices like projector, object cameras etc. Relevant media clips, movies and audio-visuals are frequently shown to the students. The college has five classrooms with LCD projectors, DVD player and other teaching tools. Many of the teachers deliver lectures through power point presentations. Teachers make full use of the various software to encourage the students' interest in the subject and enhance their knowledge. Students are encouraged to make presentations in the class with the help of LCD projector.

BEST PRACTICES:

- **SARJANA**

Context : In the early nineties, a group of teachers specially from the departments of Hindi, English and Sanskrit, felt a need to rejuvenate themselves and redefine their role as teachers of literature. It was felt that by passively conveying the opinions of critics and teaching literary theories, teachers of literature can never do justice to the art of arousing power of creativity lying dormant in the students. The desire to say and do something original and creative persistently enthused Dr.Savitri Srivastava, the then Head, Department of Hindi, along with like-minded colleagues to create a platform where they could give expression to their creativity.

Practice : This intense desire led them to form the core body of *Sarjana* comprising teachers and students of literature. It decided to meet once every month and 18th was the singled out date. The practice of this creative forum was to read out original poems composed both by the teachers and students. Gradually more and more students from different departments joined to recite their original poems and read out short stories. One fondly remembers those years when *Sarjana* touched a height as students published hand-written *Sarjana magazine* containing well edited poems both by teachers and students. This activity continued for approximately six years. One must mention the emergence of a little wall magazine, two issues of which came out successfully. The entire job was accomplished by students and teachers jointly. *Sarjana* gradually started celebrating its annual day when renowned writers from the world of Hindi literature graced the programme as guests of honour and encouraged the students and staff members profoundly with their suggestions and motivation. Around the seventh year of *Sarjana*, a different orientation was given to it. Instead of remaining as merely a literary forum, *Sarjana* assumed the capacity of a multi-dimensional platform which promoted, projected and applauded various academic and cultural activities pursued by students in the college. Quiz, debate, essay-writing, oration on the one hand supported the academic output of students and theatre, dance, song, painting, rangoli, mehndi, flower decoration and many other creative activities sustained the extra-curricular and cultural activities of the students.

Objective : The dynamism of *Sarjana* is in fact its sheet anchor that has sustained it all these years of changes and enabled it to face the challenges by imparting to it an all-inclusive and flexible attitude. It has diversified its creative identity into myriad branches of academic and cultural pursuits. In short, *Sarjana* looks forward

- to enhance the creativity of students
- to enhance the organizational and managerial skill of students
- to promote the overall personality development of students
- to create greater opportunities for students to interact

Impact : At present, *Sarjana* is helping a number of students to realize their creative potential through this platform. It is preparing them to grow in a multi-dimensional manner. They are prepared for inter-university cultural and academic competitions and interactions and meet experts of national level.

The students win not only individual prizes and certificates in all the events but there is a great incentive to win the running shield of *Sarjana*. B.A. Part-I, Part-II, Part-III and M.A I & II contest fiercely to grab this running shield.

Obstacles: Previously the college faced an acute space problem to accommodate the majority of its students under one roof. In 2004, an open stage was built to facilitate the organizing the competitions. Sometimes family practices and taboos restrict the students from participation. We counsel the parents and the success rate is encouraging.

Activity (2015-16) :-The academic and cultural forum of the college, "Sarjana", organised 13 competitions in two phases. The first phase was organised from Sept 28-29, 2015 and October 3, 2015 and the second phase was organised from February 8-9, 2016. Competitions on essay writing, speech, turncoat, poetry recitation, poster-making, rangoli, mehandi, solo song, group song, dance, theatre and collage were held. About 500 students of both undergraduate and post graduate classes participated in the events. The running shield was won by B.A. III year.

The closing ceremony of Sarjana was presided over by Mrs. Uma Bhattacharya (retd. civil servant and alumna of the college) and Dr. Neerja Madhav (Programme Officer, AIR, Varanasi and well-known writer) was the Chief Guest. Distinguished members of the executive committee of the Theosophical Society were also present.

- **UDAAN : WOMEN’S STUDY CELL**

Context: The women’s study cell of the college started (in 2004) with a purpose to make students aware about the socio-cultural economic, political and legal standing of 21st century woman in India. The founder members/co-ordinators of this college cell, have always been active participants of the CWSD, B.H.U. since its inception (i.e. in 1988). They, over the years, have sharpened their acumen in this branch of study and social work, which addresses the gender problems.

Practice: Before starting the cell “Udaan” in a formal shape, the college persistently encouraged the teachers and students to create a platform where activities on gender problems could be meaningfully addressed. Udaan has brought the students at the centre of activities. They are empowered to face the challenges of the socio-cultural violence, economic and political marginalization. This vibrating platform ensures total students’ participation in decision-making. The organizational setup involves both the students and staff members (Teaching & Non-Teaching both).

Objectives :

- To empower the students to face the challenges of the socio – cultural violence, economic and political marginalisation.
- To open minds of students to issues and problems relating to the status and role of women in India.
- To make them aware of the differences in the treatment of the genders at home and at work place.
- To tutor students on laws set up to uphold their rights.
- To study the role and contribution of women in the evolution of society.
- To lay bare forms of oppression adopted against women.
- To bring the students at the centre of activities and to ensure their total participation in decision making.

Impact: *Udaan* is a forum which has created gender sensitization among not only students but also our staff members. The latest laws and developments in the area of women empowerment are discussed amongst students and teachers which enlighten them immensely. Udaan has, in previous years, invited social activists and eminent speakers to lay bare the reports of various committees formed especially to address women related issues. Students have also staged a number of *shruti-natak* addressing various issues like women education, dowry deaths, rape victims, domestic violence and sex determination etc. All these activities have awakened and empowered students' confidence in meeting the various challenges that life may pose to them.

Obstacles:

- The college has limited space which sometimes poses a hindrance to full-fledged activity on the part of cells like Udaan.
- There is time constraint due to multiple co-curricular activities.
- Limited funds.

Structure of Udaan :

Patron – Principal

Co-ordinator – 1 Faculty member

Executive Body – 5 Faculties and students from B.A.& M.A.

General Body :- Teaching and Non-teaching staff and students of VKM.

Activity (2015-16) :-The Women Study Cell of the college, “Udaan” aims to analyse and bring to light the various levels of female psyche or consciousness.

A workshop on “**Social Surfing**” by the Centre for Social Research was held at Vasant Kanya Mahavidyalaya, Kamachha on 22nd January, 2016 under the banner of Udaan. It provided an active platform for discussing issues like harassment through social media and how to use privacy settings, use of Hindi as a means of preventing hacking and customisation. The discussion moved on to debate the free basics by Facebook and how social media can be used as a tool for counter-speech. Speakers were Shri Amitabh Kumar(Head, Media & Communication, Centre for Social Research, New Delhi) and Shri Vikram Chauhan. 261 students participated in the workshop.

A scooty rally was also organised on 24.01.2016 under the "Beti Bachao, Beti Padhao" programme of the Prime Minister. 50 students of undergraduate and post graduate classes and staff participated in the rally.

D. POST ACCREDITATION INITIATIVES

Post Accreditation Initiatives

The NAAC peer team visited the College in February, 2007. The team in its report commended the initiatives taken by the College till then and also showed concern in some areas. The College considered these recommendations and appropriate action was taken to implement them.

- 1) **Augmentation of Physical Infrastructure** –
The College under Building Grant from UGC has extended its Academic Block B and added 10 classrooms, 1 staff room, 1 computer lab and 1 reading room for students. Home Science lab was renovated and given more space. Psychology lab was also given more space. This expansion of physical infrastructure aided in running more courses – PG and job oriented.
- 2) **Need to initiate courses** –
College started in 2009 courses in Spoken English and in 2013 course in Fashion Designing.
- 3) **Need to start few programmes for PG Degree** –
The College started programmes for PG Degree in five subjects in 2009-
 - Hindi
 - English
 - Home Science
 - Psychology
 - Sociology
- 4) **Need to start add on courses** –
Spoken English and Fashion Designing were started in 2009 and 2013 respectively, with seed money from UGC and approved by BHU.
- 5) **Provision of Vocational Courses** –
The add on courses have aided students in securing jobs or even starting their own business in fashion apparel industry.
- 6) **Need to augment resource mobilization** –
The add on courses were initially started with seed money from UGC, however these courses are now self-financed courses.
- 7) **Need to upgrade computer cell and integrate it with teaching-learning process** – The College has a computer lab with about 26 computers. Students and teachers can simultaneously work on these computers. Internet facility is available in the Lab. There are 2 computers placed in staff room and 4 in reading room of the library. All the computers are internet enabled. Psychology, Home Science, Sociology, Spoken English Departments have computers and laptops assigned to them. Teachers are making optimum use of the facilities in augmenting their teaching methodology. 90% of the teachers use ICT tools in imparting knowledge to students. Students are also encouraged to present their assignments through power point. This has immensely contributed to enhance teaching learning experience of faculty and students.
- 8) **Need to upgrade Library** –
Library has 24723 books and 41 periodicals etc. The library was fully automated in 2015-16. The library is making use of software WEBOPAC.

It is also enrolled with INFLIBNET and provides access to e-journals through N-List. Library has 11 Computers that are internet enabled. The issue and return of books is done with barcode scanner.

9) **Diversification and upgradation of sports facility –**

College has one Volley ball field which is also used as Kabaddi & Kho-Kho ground. It has facility for badminton court too. The College gets access to Basket Ball field, as and when required.

To co-ordinate sports facility, the college has a sports committee which besides organizing annual sports day; keeps organizing sports events throughout the year. Sports events usually organized are : Kho-kho; Kabaddi, Volleyball; Race; Badminton; Athletics.

Students of VKM also participate in NCC wings of BHU. Our students have participated and won prizes in various sports at District, State and National Level.

Report of the Sports Committee 2015-16

10. **Upgradation and extension of Hostel –**

Vasant Balika Vihar, the hostel for the students is run by the parent body BEF. Presently, Principal is its Manager and one faculty is Administrative Warden and two are Wardens. Appropriate and timely interventions have been made in the Hostel to improve the facility provided by it to our students.

Plan for its extension is ready and will be commenced as soon as possible.

11. **Upgradation of teaching technology gadgetry –**

Under Additional Grants to Colleges covered under Section 12 (B) of the UGC Act, the College has purchased a number of computers, laptops, LED projectors, object camera etc. The UGC also assisted the college by providing funds that were used by departments to purchase equipments, enrich library, purchase computers along with customized software and provide internet facility, create smart-rooms etc.

The College established IQAC as per guidelines of NAAC on 18.12.2007. The Cell has been working since then, to ensure quality teaching- learning and research. The AQARs of past years (till 2015-16) have been sent to NAAC.

The Counselling Cell of the College has been working religiously to orient the students. The aims & objectives of the cell are:

- To help the students in vocational development.
- To help the students in their overall personality development.
- To identify and motivate the students from the weaker sections of society.
- To identify the learning difficulties of students and help them overcome the same.

14. **Need to establish and develop a placement cell -**

In the year 2011-12, the Placement Cell of the college came into existence. The Cell strives to prepare the students to face the challenges towards employment in the globalized world. Following are the objectives of Placement Cell :

- To provide ample opportunities for placement of students.
- To inform and motivate the students to attend campus recruitment of BHU with industries, NGOs and business houses of repute from all over India.
- To promote career counseling by lectures.
- Create awareness among students regarding available career options and help them in identifying their career objectives and act as a bridge between the students, alumni and employers.

PLACEMENT CELL ACTIVITIES 2015-16

- The Placement Coordination Cell of Banaras Hindu University instructed the College Counselling - Committee and IQAC to collect the bio-data of interested students and provided a sample proforma of resume and registration. The college committee displayed the same on the notice board on 09.10.2015.
- 3 students of M.A. (Hindi) appeared for the interview of Azim Premji Foundation.
- Two students of the Deptt. of the Home Science secured jobs in Navodaya Institute of Fashion Technology, Varanasi.
- 4 Students of the Deptt. of Home Science are working in Saumya Creations, Lahartara, Varanasi, as freelance designers.
- 2 students of the Deptt. of the Home Science were offered jobs by Umrai Fashion, Lohta, Varanasi.

15. Recognition of College as Research Centre –

The University has allowed five departments of the College to guide research. The College proposes to open PG in more subjects so that all the departments of the College will be able to pursue research.

The College has 61 computers with internet facility. The detailed specifications of computer are given in Annexure No.12 of the SSR.

2. Well qualified faculty members - The faculty members are distinguished in their areas of expertise having outstanding scholarly publication.
3. Excellence in teaching economics - The department promotes excellence in teaching economics. The dedicated teachers of the department work effortlessly to make the students aware about various economic problems.
4. Well Co-ordination between teacher and taught- Since the girl students come from various parts of India and most of them are not having knowledge of basic mathematics therefore the department has to keep a proper coordination between the students 24×7.

Weakness of the department:

1. **Lack of resources** - The College has limited resources therefore the department is not able to specialise in various fields.
2. **Not having P.G. Course** - Although the students are encouraged to develop a deep understanding of the subject at the U.G. level but the department is unable to link the students to job market because the department is not having P.G. course at its disposal.
3. **Lack of facilities for Research** - The faculty members are interested in having a vibrant research culture, but since the department is not having P.G. course therefore the faculty members are not given the right to research (Ph.D.)
4. **Lack of Infrastructure** - Due to lack of infrastructure the department is not able to divide the class into sections which leads to overcrowded class room and the quality of teaching gets affected due to it.

Opportunities:

1. **Job Opportunities** - Economics is one of the popular subjects which can help the students to link itself to the job market, if P.G. course is offered by the department, the students could find more and more avenues open for getting jobs.
2. **Research Opportunity** - The subject is gaining more and more relevance nowadays. It offers a unique opportunity for students to engage in inquiry in their chosen field of study and develop practical hands on knowledge if research opportunity is offered.

3. **Self Employment** - The department is seriously engaged in creation of entrepreneurs since the government is not able to offer jobs to the increasing demographic dividends.
4. **Human Resource Development** - The department is dedicated towards converting the population into human capital. Since the college deals with the education of girls therefore we empower them not only for job market but for the day to day living.

Challenges of the department:

1. **Teaching the students without mathematics** - The girl students come from far away villages where they are not taught basic mathematics because mathematics is considered as a subject which is beneficial for the upliftment of the male students. Therefore the faculty finds difficult to teach the papers which has lots of mathematics.
2. **Language problem** - Most of the students come from villages and they are not friendly with English and most of the books are in English. Therefore the students find it difficult to follow the theories taught.
3. **Not having P.G. course** - Since the department is having only U.G. course at its disposal therefore the students have to go to other colleges and universities for P.G.
4. **Lack of Staff members** - The department is having only 03 permanent faculty members therefore the department is not able to start new papers for upliftment of the students.
5. **Research Facility** - The department is not having research facility. Research is not only essential for the teacher but also for upliftment of U.G. students.





3. The affiliation and recognition [if application] is valid as on date.

In case the affiliation / recognition is conditional, then a detailed enclosure with regard to compliance of conditions by the institution will be sent.

It is noted that NAAC's accreditation, is granted, shall stand cancelled automatically once the institution loses its University affiliation or Recognition by the Regulatory Council, as the case may be.



Preface:-

Vasant Kanya Mahavidyalaya, Varanasi was established on 10th of July 1954. The College comes under the category of Grant-in-Aid Institution of U.P. Govt. to impart education to women.

It is permanently affiliated to the Banaras Hindu University, Varanasi. It got UGC recognition under 2(f) and 12(B) in July 1956. The College enjoys certain amount of autonomy in academic matters. The campus is spread over about 3000 sq meters in an urban area. The institution was established with the mission to spread collegiate education and disseminate the same to female youth and empower them, both socially and economically. The College currently offers one programme, i.e. Bachelor of Arts, comprising two faculties namely, Faculty of Arts and Faculty of Social Science. The college offers three year B.A. (Hon's) course in Arts and Social Science streams. There are 765 students on rolls (2006-07) getting education in various disciplines, There are 34 faculty members on teaching staff, and 29 of them have Ph.D. as highest academic qualifications to their credit and only one teacher has post graduation as highest academic qualification. However, the non Ph.D. teachers have qualified the NET as per requirements. The college does not have temporary or part time teachers. There are 25 personnel working in the college comprising technical and administrative staff. During the previous batch 25 percent students qualified in first class and 4 of them got ranks. The recruitment of faculty is on UGC and State norms while the non-teaching staff is appointed on the basis of state rules. The college is presently imparting

education in 09 Arts subjects and 5 subjects belonging to social science faculty. These are Hindi, English, Sanskrit (Languages and Literature both), Philosophy, Ancient Indian History Culture and Archaeology, Painting, Instrumental Music (Sitar), Vocal Music and Home Science in the Faculty of Arts, while Political Science, Economics, History, Sociology and Psychology are in the Faculty of Social Sciences. The college annual budget is assessed by Department of Higher Education, Allahabad and 47.5 percent of finances are provided by U.P. State Govt, another 47.5 percent by UGC and remaining 5 percent of college budget is provided by the College Management.

The unit cost of education is Rs.17167.71 per annum, which includes salary of the staff. If the salary component is excluded the unit cost of education works out Rs.248.53 per annum. The education programme of the college is based on annual pattern. The dropout rate of students is just 0.1 percent (2005-06). The college has academic support system and limited infrastructure available to facilitate education. It has 281 working days. The college is observing the UGC requirement of 180 teaching days. The college has more than 18.5 thousand books available in its library and 10 computers. It has completed a few research projects with total financial outlay of Rs.1.44 lacs. There are 7 research projects currently going on with financial outlay of Rs.3.2 lacs. Many renowned academics have visited the institution and it has established this as a tradition. It has Alumni Association, which provides a few scholarships and medals to the students. The college also generates some seed money from donations.

The following report is based on the academic interaction and performance assessment worked out by the peer team.

SECTION 2: CRITERION-WISE ANALYSIS.

Criterion 1: Curricular Aspects

The College has been influenced by the philosophy and the intellectual experiences of Dr. Annie Besant and Mahamana Pt. Madan Mohan Malaviya. The driving force of the institution is "*education as service*". The College endeavours to link education and culture and gives the special emphasis to imbibe the finest cultural traditions of the land. The education efforts of the college are to synthesize full freedom with total sense of responsibility and confidence. Taking regard to the aforesaid objectives, the institution provides honours degree courses in Arts and social science stream to women students. It provides degree courses for arts in 09 subjects and 5 subjects in social sciences. These are Hindi, English, Sanskrit, Philosophy, AIIC, Painting, Music Instrumental Sitar, Music Vocal and Home Science in arts stream and political science, economics, history, sociology and psychology in social sciences. The college imparts education mostly in conventional subjects and no career-oriented courses have been introduced so far. The syllabi are framed by Board of Undergraduates studies of BHU in which some faculty of the college are members. It follows annual pattern of education and has qualified faculty to teach the subjects. The teachers participate in board of studies meetings while new courses/ changes in syllabi are proposed. The courses remain unchanged for the last 3 years. The academic audit of the college is conducted by Banaras Hindu University. The range of options and the choice of subjects are limited in view of lesser number of disciplines available.

Criterion II:

Teaching, Learning and Evaluation,

The admission to various courses is based on All-India undergraduate entrance test conducted by Banaras Hindu University. The University constitutes a central admission committee and takes college staff on it as per requirement. The college organizes remedial courses for under-privileged sections of society like SC/ST to cope with courses in English, Psychology and All-IC and Archaeology as per UGC guidelines. UGC has allocated Rs.17,340.00 to the college during the X plan for the purpose. The student knowledge is updated by encouraging them to participate in college competitions, seminars and workshops. The college supplement lecture method of teaching with other learner-centered methods of assignments, workshops, audio-visual facility, field trips, etc. However, the college does not use modern teaching technology and communication gadgetry on a large scale. The college is very structured in terms of its teaching plan and, therefore, encourages teachers to design and implement a time bound teaching plan at the beginning of academic calendar. The ratio of student to full time teacher is 21:1 and the ratio of teaching staff to non teaching staff stand 1.3:1. The percentage of classes engaged by full time faculty is 100. It has permanent full time faculty which is engaged in teaching of existing courses. The students are assessed by annual examination and periodical written tests during the session. The college monitors the overall performance of students at the beginning of the year at two levels: *Level One* B.A. Part-I through UET index and B.A.Part-III: overall marks in BA Part-I and II. *Level Two*: Joint address by Principal and teachers during general assembly at the beginning of each session and special introduction regarding methods and strategies of organizing the study by

teachers. The recruitment of faculty is done by proper selection committee approved by Banaras Hindu University and college management.

On the basis of assessment of workload of teaching, new teaching positions are created by college management committee and forwarded to the State Govt. and the University for approval. The college enjoys certain amount of autonomy and freedom in deciding benefits to be given to recruited teacher. There are 12 teachers who have been resource persons in national workshops during the past two years. The college has conducted 4 seminars sponsored by UGC during 2006 and one seminar in collaboration with ABS Institute of Social Development. It has also organized 6 extension lectures by eminent academics during 2005 and 2006. There are 3 teachers who have undergone refresher course and the other 3 teachers have successfully completed orientation course. As many as 34 teachers have participated in seminars / conferences/ workshops.

The governance of college administration is democratic and decentralized. There are various committees constituted for academic and administrative functioning of the college. There is better coordination among the faculty and non teaching staff in discharge of their responsibilities for functioning of college. The students' feedback on the faculty is also examined by a committee to look into the various aspects of feedback and to link it with improvement in teaching learning processes. The activities of the college like, "Sarjana", "Sanskrit Matri Mandalam" and "Udaan" are stepping stone to take the mission of the college further.

Criterion III:

Research, Consultancy and Extension:

Though Vasant Kanya Mahavidyalaya Varanasi, is an undergraduate institution, the faculties have shown a keen interest in research in the form of research projects, publication of books, research papers and articles in academic journals/periodicals. A faculty member from the Dept. of Sociology has been resource person for national and international seminars and workshops. One of the significant features of this institution is that almost all teachers have Ph.D. degree to their credit. They are encouraged to undertake research activity. Earlier a faculty member from Sociology Dept. has been honoured and awarded by Women Welfare and Child Development Department, Varanasi and Central Social Welfare Board, U.P. Another faculty member from Dept. of English has been awarded at the District, State, and National level by Govt. and Non Govt. agencies. There are 7 minor research projects in various disciplines sponsored by UGC and 01 from Sahitya Academy. The college also provides study leave to teachers to improve their academic qualifications. It does not have publication division, however, it publishes college magazine regularly. The college has also published a book entitled "Women's Rights as Human Rights: Obstacle and Opportunities." In the present session the college has published four more books with the assistance of UGC.

The college is continuously engaged with extension activities. It has opened up 30 adult education centers in slums run by students. It has 3 units of NSS which carry out regular activity and special camping programmes independently and sometimes in collaboration with NGOs. The NSS has organized programmes on disaster management, medical

camps, child abuse and literacy drives. "Udaan", the Women Study Cell of the College trains the young women to be aware of social problems, gender related issues and ways to overcome them. 400 volunteers of "Udaan" participated in a rally organized against "child sexual abuse". The "Sarjana", a creative forum organizes a number of literary and cultural events. In January 2007, BHU organized inter faculty youth festival "Spandan" in 30 items in which 70 students of the college participated and 17 of them got prizes. The college is actively engaged in extension activities and has taken up timely issues like, Ganga Pollution Problems and environmental hazards. The extension activities are also supplemented by NCC cadets. The college has enrolled 09 cadets in the army wing, another 09 in navy wing and 19 cadets in the air wing. As part of extension of social activities, the college has vocational guidance of counseling cell to guide its students in the matters of career.

Criterion IV:

Infrastructure and Learning Resource:

The college is spread over an area of 2999.86 Sq.mts in urban Varanasi. The administrative wing, academic wing, psychology wing, library, canteen and painting block are the main facilities on the campus. Despite limitation of space, the college infrastructure is put to its optimum use. The college maintains its infrastructure by grants received from the UP State, Higher Education Department, UGC development assistance, and its internal resource mobilization. It maintains the optimum use of its given infrastructure through various committees. It also maintains campus premises and has constituted a maintenance

committee for the purpose. It does not have central computer facility, but some departments like psychology department, office and library have independent small computer facility. There is a computer cell with 6 systems which caters to the needs of the college. The limited space at the campus in civil structures poses a constraint for the college to undertake various academic and sports programmes.

The college has a library over a built-up area of 240 sq meters. It has book-bank facility with 1604 books. The library has 18915 books available and subscribes to 6 national journals and 19 magazines. There are 16270 text books and 1057 reference books available in the library. It has reading room and keeps available 6 newspapers for readers. The library is maintained by three professional staff members headed by the librarian. There is a library committee which monitors the library functioning. It is not connected with the use of services of inter university centers like IUCAA, CEC, INFLIBNET, etc.

It has first-aid facility for students received by one part time doctor. As regards to sports activities, it has maintained sports for volley ball, badminton and basket ball. There are 6 students who received certificates for participating in these games at state level, regional level, and national level. The institution has equipment facility available in the departments of psychology, home science, and department of music. The college has small hostel which caters to 14 percent of the students need.

Criterion V:

Student Support progression:

The College has good academic progression with significantly low drop-out rate. After qualifying B.A. from this college, not less than 50 percent of students go for PG programmes and about 25 percent qualify for UGC-CSIR NET/SLET and other competitive examinations. Many of the college Alumni hold good positions in academics and civil service. Some of the ex-students are noted administrators, educationists, artists and media persons. Amongst the distinguished alumni the college has an IAS officer, a Director, Kalidas Academy of Music, Fine Arts, New Delhi and another pass out holds the position as Director, Centre of Women's Studies and Development, BHU. Three of its pass outs hold the positions of Principals in various Degree Colleges of Varanasi and many are as senior faculty of BHU. The college publishes its profile every year wherein it provides most of the information about programmes / courses available, fee structure, hostel facilities, scholarships, etc. There are various categories of scholarships available to students in Vasant Kanya Mahavidyalaya. These are offered on merit to meritorious students, besides SC/ ST and OBC students. There are some scholarships offered to students of minority community and students from marginalized sections of the society. Most of the scholarships are provided by the State Government. There are a number of scholarships offered by college management and alumnae to students. During 2006-07, 95 SC/ST students received scholarships, 85 students in OBC category and 2 minority students who were given scholarships. The college does not have placement / employment cell but teachers do offer counseling and guidance to students from time to time. It has career counseling cell operational from 2000-01. The college also has

Alumni Association which meets once in a year. In addition to these facilities, the college has indoor clubs and indoor games and keeps students engaged in indoor games and extra-curricular activities. These relate to debating and cultural programmes including dance, music and theatre. The college cultural forum called "*Sarjana*" remains active throughout the year in organizing literary events.

Criterion VI

Organization and Management:

The college management is decentralized and democratic and has internal coordinating and monitoring mechanism with the Principal as head. The Principal and the committees constitute built-in mechanism to check and monitor work efficiency of college in general and that of non-teaching staff in particular. The college also arranges professional orientation programmes to benefit non-teaching staff. There has been marginal increase in college fee structure in the recent years. In Xth Five Year Plan the college spent on books and journals Rs.1.52 Lakhs only out of the total grant received Rs.2.08 Lakhs. Out of Rs.1.38 Lakhs grant received for equipments, the college has spent so far Rs.74,700.00 on the same.

The college has grievance redressal cell for its staff. The welfare schemes are the same as provided by the UP Govt. like housing loan, car loan etc. There is no teacher welfare fund or any other welfare or social security scheme given by the college management committee. The de-centralized mechanism has been reflected in the committees like student welfare advisory committee, grant collection and expenditure

committee, admission* committee, examination committee, parent-teacher association committee, maintenance committee, building committee, library committee, cultural committee, etc. The non teaching staffs were benefited during 2005 by certain professional development programmes like communication skill enhancement and computer awareness.

Criterion VII

Healthy Practices:

The college has developed some healthy traditions and practices over the years. These healthy practices are given below:

- The college has established rich "value based" education.
- The college frequently invites eminent academics for extension lectures and interactions.
- The institution has well-managed coordinated mechanism for efficient functioning on everyday basis.
- The college also provides scholarships generated by Alumni;
- It collaborates with NGOs for extension programmes showing the community development concerns.
- The college has a book-bank facility for students.
- The college encourages the faculty to undertake research activity.
- The college has open air theatre and has organized excellent traditional cultural activities throughout the session.
- It has formed a society called "Udaan" as a guiding platform for student personality development.
- It has "Sarjana" a creative forum to enhance creativity among students.

Section B

Overall Analysis

The peer team visited Vasant Kanya Mahavidyalaya, Varanasi, UP from 26th to 27th Feb. 2007 for validation of self- study report. During the visit, the discussions were held with stakeholders, faculty and other staff. On the basis of assessment of infrastructure, academic support system, curriculum and co-curriculum aspects, the members visited all departments and held discussions at length with management, parents, students, non teaching staff, faculty and alumni. On the basis of assessment the peer team makes the following commendations and invite attention of the institution to certain areas of concern and, therefore, make the recommendations

Commendations:

The peer team members would like to record the following commendable aspects.

- The college has about 98 percent of its faculty having Ph.D. degree to their credit;
- The faculty is undertaking research projects sponsored by UGC;
- The college has developed a tradition of inviting eminent academics as guest faculty;
- The college also has book bank facility for students;
- The drop-out rate of students is extremely low;
- There is a good coordination between the head of the institution and faculty in efficient management of college and institutional affairs;

- The management of college and its governance is democratic and decentralized;
- The college makes efforts for internal resource mobilization;
- The college organizes extension activities in collaboration with NGOs;
- It has organized national workshops in various disciplines;
- It encourages faculty to improve academic qualification by granting study leave;
- The college organizes meetings with its alumni;
- The college is engaged in personality development and self-confidence building among its students;
- The college has faculty assessment by collection of student feedback (through structured questionnaire, twice a year);
- It has a motto "*education as a service*" and driving force like "*Udaan*" for personality development of students and a programme for community development;
- It makes optimum use of its limited infrastructure;
- Many of the faculty members have got awards recognizing their scholarship and creativity in the past;
- The faculties are actively engaged in research and have good number of publication to their credit;

Areas of concern and recommendations:

- The college needs to augment its physical infrastructure and space to accommodate existing courses and widen the scope for new career and job oriented courses;

GUIDANCE AND COUNSELLING CELL

Since the inception of the College, teachers have been informally counselling and guiding the students both in their personal and academic problems. The task of counselling starts with the process of admission in the form of guidance provided by the teachers in selecting subjects according to their (student) interest as well as ability. This process continues throughout the year, and the teachers counsel the students to overcome their academic, social, financial and personal problems.

Formally, the Guidance and Counselling Cell came into existence in the year 2000. Dr. Sudha Srivastava was the In-charge of the Cell. At that time, the functions of the Cell were divided into two parts:

- a) To provide guidance to overcome various challenges faced by the students in their day to day lives.
- b) To provide career counselling by imparting relevant information.

Additionally, in the year 2011-12, the Placement Cell of the college came into existence. After that, the functions allocated to the Guidance and Counselling Cell were:


GUIDANCE SERVICES: Guidance is provided for problems related to educational and career planning, lack of concentration, faulty study habits, examination anxiety, coping with academic stress and adjustment problems.

PSYCHOLOGICAL COUNSELLING: Counselling is imparted for tackling problems of emotional nature such as those involving negative interpersonal relationships, family discord, anxiety, aggression, depression etc., stressing overall growth and achievement.

Rationale:

- To help the students in solving their personal, educational, social as well as psychological problems.
- To help the students in making appropriate adjustment to the current situation, in the educational institution, the occupational world, the home or the community.
- To help the students in vocational development.
- To help the students in their overall personality development.
- To identify and motivate the students from the weaker sections of society.
- To identify the learning difficulties of students and help them overcome the same.

STRUCTURE OF GUIDANCE AND COUNSELLING CELL



The Cell comprises of the Patron, who is the Principal (ex-officio), an In-charge and 5 faculty members, along with a student representative.

ACTIVITIES OF THE GUIDANCE AND COUNSELLING CELL 2015-16

Student's Feedback Report

Vasant Kanya Mahavidyalaya, Kamachha, Varanasi

Students are the most important stakeholders. An institution must assess the feedback of its students regarding the syllabi, quality of teaching, student-teacher relationship in order to promote its quality and progression. For this, the college has a specified procedure to collect and analyze data on student - learning process and focuses on the teaching skills of its faculty, co-curricular & extra curricular activities, institutional environment as well as the students' growth. At the end of each academic year, the students give their feedback on individual faculty members, overall institutional environment and other learning facilities on a prescribed format which is collected by the Feedback Committee of the college.

The feedback committee, consisting of competent teachers, collects the exit level feedback from the Graduate & Post Graduate students regarding the teaching-learning processes. It collects all feedbacks in the form of questionnaires and discusses the outcomes in the staff meeting. The College then takes steps to implement the same. In meetings held for curricular development in the departments of the affiliating University, the faculty put forward the suggestions of the students of the college. The inputs are further used to improvise the overall competence of the students and the staff members.

The feedback includes the overall evaluation of various programmes of the college made by the students. The sample comprised of approximately 60-70% of the students of the 14 Departments of B.A. Final year and 5 Departments of PG. The overall rating was made on the basis of questions of three categories from the measure provided in the NAAC manual.

- The first category (A) had questions from -
 - i) Information provided at the time of admission
 - ii) Basis of subject selection
 - iii) Course structure, coverage and supporting facilities.
 - iv) Self- growth
 - v) Teacher-student / Administration-student relationship
 - vi) Institutional environment
 - vii) Students' assessment of the institutions, and
 - viii) Impact of the institution
- The second category (B) comprised of teacher's evaluation by the students.
- The next category (C) includes suggestions by the students. The result received from the feedback has been graphically represented and duly attached.

Category (A)

The feedback provided by the students of the college reveals that the overall academic content, teaching mechanism and institutional contribution in learning was helpful for the students.

A list of the feedback obtained in this category is given below :-

- 1) **Informations provided at the time of admission:** Data from the past 5 years shows that, initially, due to lack of awareness on the part of the students, the college information brochure did not prove to be highly effective in providing relevant academic & non-academic details related to the college. But in the year 2015-16, we see a remarkable rise in the rating which could be a result of the brochure being counselled well and made available on the website. In this year 60% students felt the College information brochure was helpful in their understanding of the course and other campus facilities.
- 2) **Basis of Subject Selection** - 74% of the students were successful in getting the honours subject of choice which proves the success of college counselling committee at the time of admission.
- 3) **Course Structure, Coverage & Supporting facilities:-**98% of the students were in favour of the course. In the past 5 years, the U.G. & P.G. syllabi as well as the student's own background for benefitting from the courses was reported to be adequate. The feedback provided by the students indicate that the percentage of the syllabus completed by the teachers was above 90%. Students' rating of the preparedness of teachers regarding their classes was also observed to be high (90%). So far as the practical subjects are concerned the college has five departments which impart practical training (Painting, Music (Vocal), Music (Instrumental), Home Science and Psychology).
Feedback provided by the students regarding available facilities and maintenance in the lab was observed to be satisfactory. It also revealed that the academic content of the College is useful and the teaching material provided to them is helpful in enriching their knowledge. The academic content, teaching material and creation of study groups contributes a lot to enhance their knowledge. The library facilities provided to the students was rated satisfactory although students gave their suggestions for its betterment. However in the year 2015-16, the recruitment of new library staff and automation process has geared up the facilities in the library.
- 4) **Self Growth:** The rating provided on the basis of the study of students' self-growth, is consistently improving (90%). Students felt that the college contributed positively to their intellectual gain and their inclination towards attaining higher education.
- 5) **Teacher-Student / Administration-Student Relationship:** In this category, the scores of 2015-16 show that students had a favourable relationship with the teachers/ administration. They were satisfied with the regularity, punctuality and helpful comments of the teachers. They reported teachers and office staff to be helpful. 90% students reported their relation with their teachers to be satisfactory whereas 80% held that the administration was helpful towards them.
- 6) **Institutional Environment :-** The rating given to the institutional environment indicates a favourable trend (98% in 2015-16). Respondents found that the support received from the college for recreational and extra-curricular activities was very positive. Apart from

regular teaching, the college conducts various recreational and extra-curricular activities like debates, discussions, cultural programmes, fete and exhibitions which help them in exploring their inner potentials as human beings and contribute to the personality development of the students.

CATEGORY (B)

1) The overall rating of programmes and the college by the students was excellent. 99% of the students gave high scores to the academic programmes, staff members, co-curricular activities and other facilities. They were satisfied with teachers' behaviour. The scores obtained in this category was constantly favourable for the past five years. Students described teachers' approach as courteous and reported them to be helpful. Questions asked in this category, regarding the internal evaluation pattern, were answered positively by the respondents. They agreed that their assignments were discussed by their teachers. 98% students found internal assessment by teachers to be fair. Students' participation was promoted through the following methods:

- Encourage questions
- Discussions within the classroom.
- Discussion outside the class.


A good number of students perceived that the teachers encourage students active participation in the class and their assignments were discussed by the concerned teachers. They reported that they were provided with an outline of the course and lectures before the commencement of teaching which was in effect followed by the teachers and proved immensely helpful.

2) Impact of the institution on its students was rated as favourable (95%). Most of them felt privileged to be studying at V.K.M founded by Dr. Annie Besant and affiliated to B.H.U. Even after completing their respective courses, they planned to keep in touch with their concerned teachers through e-mail, social media, phone etc. They will also consult their teachers regarding their career-choice, further studies etc.

On the basis of the feedback received from the students, certain conclusions have been drawn, such as :-

1. Betterment of the canteen and drinking water facilities.
2. Better book circulation facilities at the library.
3. Creation of smart classes in the college.
4. Expediting work at the office counters.

Research / Studies / Service benefitting the community

- 1) Action Research is being carried out by Dr.Kumud Ranjan, Associate Professor, Department of Sociology, to create awareness among rural women regarding literacy, environment, panchayat and empowerment, in collaboration with social institutions like WLC (World Literacy of Canada) and Lions Club. She imparts training in self-employment to women both in city and villages.
- 2) Dr. Akhilesh Rai, Assistant Professor, Sociology, has undertaken a case study of Bihar in his research focussing on the shift in power in OBC at social, economic and political levels. He has pointed to how this shift can be seen in the future.
- 3) Ms. Kalpana Anand, Assistant Professor, Sociology, has done her research in the socio-economic planning of University teachers and has analysed how University teachers have planned for their old age and what steps should be taken to ensure a safe future.
- 4) Dr. Indu Upadhyay studied the perception of the traders regarding Value Added Tax (VAT) in Varanasi City in her project entitled Value Added Tax : A Boon or Bane (A Case Study of Varanasi City). The outcome of the study was that the traders were agitating against VAT because they were not aware of the socio-economic benefit of VAT.
- 5) Dr. Anju Lata Singh worked on the effect of automation reliability and mental workload on automation- induced complacency in flight simulation task performance.

Data were collected non-pilots college going students. The finding of the research would be applied in designing appropriate training plans for those organizations/ companies where the employees are engaged in multitask scenarios like Pilots, Drivers, Automobile Sector etc.

The findings are also useful for designing & redesigning of complex task in order to avoid higher mental workload of the workers (employees).

- 6) Dr. Shubhra Sinha worked on Gender Differences in Intergenerational Relationship in the Context of Socialization and aimed to examine gender differences in parent-child relationship. Parent-child relationship is the most reverberating theme in the current context.

She analyzed the difference between mothers and fathers with respect to the parenting they display for sons and daughters and the difference between the perception of boys and girls regarding parenting behaviour and the quality of relationship. She found biologically transmitted and socially reinforced differences between mothers and fathers make them handle their children in somewhat different ways, but these differences are within limits. These stylistic differences between mothers and fathers are more complementary than contrasting. Gender differences in adolescents are relatively more pronounced than in parents. These differences can be ascribed to both biological and social conditions.



College Publications


